

Mrs. Emma Gooden Gives Service To Community

 "I feel this is God's work . . . these are my people and I like to 'do' for them," says Mrs. Emma Gooden, Madrid funeral director and our Career Woman this week. Her interest extends to community service and acts of "good samaritanism", as well as professional proficiency.

Questioned about the seeming strangeness of such a profession for a woman, Mrs. Gooden explained that she grew up in the business, helping her father, Fay G. Mann, as a young girl. "I don't know as I'd like to do it anywhere else except where I know people and have a personal interest in them," she said. "But they've been good to me and my father over the years, and I like to do what I can for them."

"Emma", as she is known to the entire community, received her funeral director's license at the Simmons Embalming School, Syracuse. She was married in 1925 to Leon L. Gooden of Morley, who was a chemical engineer, employed by Travelers Insurance Co. for 34 years. He retired in 1958.

In 1947 the Gooden family returned to Madrid when her father died, and it was then that Emma Mann Gooden stepped into the breach and continued to run the business which was her father's life-work.

Since then, she has operated the Fay G. Mann Funeral Home with only the assistance of part-time drivers and, since his retirement, her husband, who says she keeps him busier than he's ever been. At the present time, Lloyd Finnegan is her driver.

She is also assisted by her son Charles (Chuck), who recently received his license also from the Simmons Embalming School. When Chuck is graduated from St. Lawrence

University two years from now, his mother expects that he will take over the operation of the funeral business started by her father, thus making the third generation at the Mann Funeral Home.

An active church worker and busy in all community activities, Mrs. Gooden's main interests are never-the-less centered about her grandchildren. She has several and, like all grandmothers, she carries a

thick folder of their pictures with her at all times and she will display them with urging at all!

That Mrs. Gooden takes a personal interest in 'her people' is evidenced in her conversation and by the remarks of others in the community.

The Goodens are parents of three children, Mrs. Richard (Fay) Cambridge, Potsdam; Leon Jr., Liverpool; and Charles, at home.

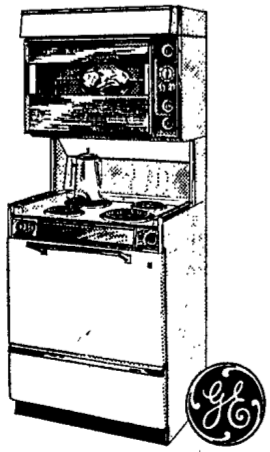
