St. Lawrence Quota For Boys State Is 8

Applications have been sent out to all American Legion Posts in St. Lawrence County who participated last year in Boy's State activities, according to announcement made by Edgar L. Schwartz, County chairman.

This year's Boy State will again be held at Colgate University, Hamilton from June 21 to June 27. The program features a citizenship training course to educate selected youths, and has been sponsored by the American Legion for many years.

St. Lawrence County has a quota of only eight boys, each boy to be sponsored by the local Post, which pays the \$35 fee in each case.

Boys must be 15 years old, and must have completed their Junior year of High School. Leadership, character, scholarship and service are the qualifications considered for selection.

At Boys State, each boy is assigned to one of 10 theoretical cities, which are in the 10 counties of the State. There are about 30 boys in each city, and they campaign and elect various officers for these cities, counties and state. All is done under the instruction and guidance of experienced teachers, lawyers and law students.

Boys have their own band, give concerts, talent shows, have their own daily newspaper, police force and court trials. Baseball teams are formed and tennis is played. Boys should be selected im-

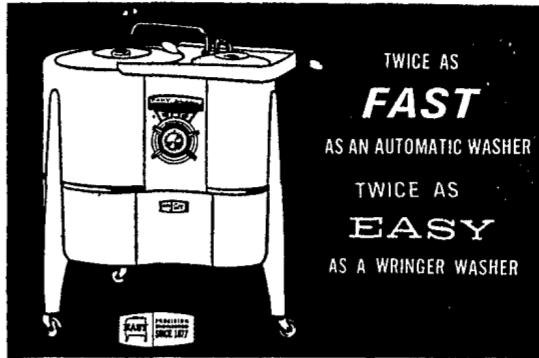
