The Dominicks first spent some time in Cairo, going from there to Athens, where she says the women are better dressed than in Cairo, but the men are not particularly outstanding or noticeable for anything!

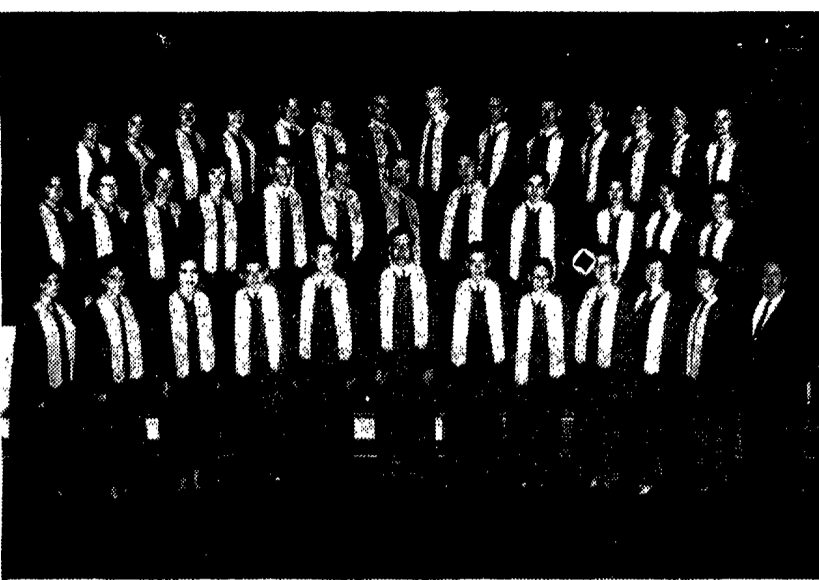
She mentions the sidewalk cafes, the narrow streets and the very reasonable food prices. "It's really hard to spend a dollar on a meal", she informs us, adding that the price varies from 60 cents to \$1.50 for two.

The public conveyances are described as fairly new, up to date and clean, the fares cheap.

The Dominicks do not stay in the main tourist areas nor take the guided tours, but rely on the public transportation accommodations, going and coming as they please. The Acropolis, the Theatre of Dionysus, the ruins of the Minerva civilization on the island of Crete, have all been on their itinerary.

Mrs. Dominick was impressed with the traces of King Monos' palace, which shows the remains of similar sanitary arrangements to our own, with pipes, sewers etc.

They plan to go from Athens to Corfu, Brindisi and to spend a week or 10 days in Rome, when we may hope to hear again from her.

He will be cited for his faithful attendance at Scottish Rite meetings, his steady flow of petitions for membership, latest count being 62, and his long service to Masonry in Waddington Lodge 393, F. & A. M., as master and then as secretary, also as a district deputy of the Second St. Lawrence District.

At The Markets

Beef is on the plentiful foods list for the sixth month in a row, according to Elizabeth Isenberg, Home Economist for the St. Lawrence County Extension Service. This will probably mean that the consumer will continue to be able to buy a variety of beef cuts at reduced "special" prices at least during May.

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service predicts that later this spring the number of beef cows coming to market will decline from its present high level. This could make cattle prices rise, with retail beef prices most likely following.

Turkey producers are expected to top last year's \$2.7 million bird crop this year. The number of turkeys sold by producers this May is expected to be about 25 percent greater than a year ago.

Milk and dairy products are again seasonally plentiful. In the first two months of 1964, milk production ran slightly above the same period in 1963, and over the next several months milk output is likely to be near last year's level.

Large peanut, cottonseed, and soybean oil production last year are expected to make salad dressings and salad oil abundant.
