Women's Vote To Be Important In 1964 Election

Washington — About this time in an election year, "the women's vote," is talked about at Washington cocktail parties, where some kind of topic is always the chief topic of conversation.

There are more than three million "potential" women voters than men, but the accent is on the "potential" because it is estimated 10 percent of the women are less apt to go to the polls than the men.

Yet more and more women no longer call politics "a nasty business" better left up to the men. This changing attitude has come, in part, from the non-partisan training of women in "active citizenship" by the League of Women Voters.

To be a queen would delight most women, but not to have more than one birthday a year!

That's the fate of 38 year old Queen Elizabeth of Great Britain. Her real birthday falls on Apr. 21, but it is celebrated around the world on different dates.

In the United States, the British Embassy chooses early June for an English kind of garden party when the roses are in bloom and the strawberries at their best. Some guests even ignore the bars at this Embassy fete the better to enjoy the luscious berries topped with Devonshire cream flown in every year from the British Isles.

Dr. Janet Travell, a physician to the President, thinks "women live longer than men because they never retire . . . just keep on doing the things they have been doing all their lives."

As more and more Kings, Emperors, Chancellors, Prime Ministers and other heads-of-state visit the United States (48 last year), the White House security agents are overwhelmed with the job of protecting their safety. Many have been threatened, including President de Gaulle of France.

The china from previous administrations (of which the dark blue-banded Harding design is the most striking) was used when the First Lady entertained the Senate wives at the White House this week. Actress Helen Hayes (an ardent Republican) presented scenes from her new play "The White House."

North Country Kitchen . . .

What is on your calendar of events for May and June? Many homemakers will be planning a luncheon for their bride club, for a bride-to-be, or for a June graduate. Good management is the key to making these social functions as much fun for the hostess, as for the guests.

One suggestion for a ladies' luncheon is to feature a jellied fruit salad. Not only do these salads have general appeal, but also, they can be prepared in advance, so that last minute preparation and disorder can be eliminated. Since all gelatin mixtures become stiffer with age, it is advisable to prepare these salads no earlier than the day before the event.

Good management means considering all details before the guests arrive. One such detail is that of achieving eye appeal. The first and foremost tool for eye appeal is color. If the jellied salad is a pale orange, try to add other colors such as green, yellow, and red, combining both light and dark. Visualize the salad plate as you plan it, rather than just when you assemble it.

There are many excellent recipes for jellied salads. But of all those I have tried, this one is the most outstanding. Its delicious flavor, light frothy texture, and excellent yield make this an ideal choice for special occasions and for family meals.

Orange Souffle Salad
12 servings
2 packages orange-flavored gelatin
1 cup hot water
1 cup orange juice
1 cup sour cream
1 pint orange sherbet
1 cup pineapple tidbits, well-drained
2 cups Mandarin orange sections, well-drained
Coconut

1. Add hot water to gelatin and stir until dissolved.
2. Add orange juice and chill mixture until it begins to thicken.
3. Stir in the sour cream and sherbet quickly and immediately beat the gelatin mixture until it is thick and foamy (at least 4 or 5 minutes).
4. Fold in the drained fruit.
5. Pour into a 2-quart mold or individual molds, and chill till set.
6. Sprinkle coconut over the unmolded salad.

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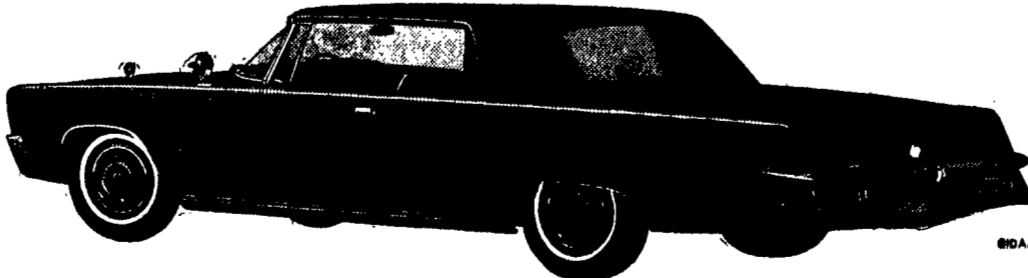
