State Lists Two Summer Classes

Two courses dealing in educational media will be offered during summer session at The State University College at Potsdam, June 28 through Aug. 6.
They are "Programmed Learning" and "Technological Aids in Education." Both courses will be taught by Dr. Paul Lamb. The Educational Media Council recently urged "informed and creative use of all kinds of media as educational tools and techniques."
A study of the use of closed circuit TV, overhead projectors and many other visual aids will be included in the technological aids course. Programmed learning is independent study through use of teaching machines as a supplement to regular classroom teaching.
Dr. Lamb has a wide background in educational media. He developed courses at The State University College at Potsdam and is now returning as a member of the Potsdam faculty from Hunter College where he was professor of education and Director of the Educational Media Center.

Jobs are hard to come by. Recently the construction job of the Federal Building in downtown Cleveland was picketed by Negro "rights" groups, protesting hiring practices. The union agreed to new hiring procedures, the picketing stopped. Although few or no Negroes live in suburbs such as Pepper Pike or Bay Village or Shaker Heights, hundreds of Negro women can be seen each evening standing on the "bus stop" corners—talking and happy. They work in the suburbs as cooks and maids and domestics. They're contented, and many made a very very decent wage and take pride in their work. But at 5 or 6 o'clock, they leave by the back door and take the public transportation to their homes in the Negro ghetto.
And all the Negro "groups" are present in Cleveland—NAACP; CORE; SNICK; etc. And even some ones never heard of before, such as the Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM). No one seems to know the purpose of this organization, but recently the Cleveland Police Chief, in a statement before the Ohio Legislative Investigating Committee, called this group as a "subversive organization bent on the overthrow of the government and the annihilation of the Caucasian race." This set off an uproar which is still going on.
Do Negroes have Civil Rights in Cleveland? Technically yes. But another question could be asked: What about the Civil Rights of others? And in a big city that becomes a problem never even contemplated in the PotSDams of the country. Negro leaders say here, as in other areas, that it will be a "long, hot summer."
Next week we'll look at the other side of the coin.
