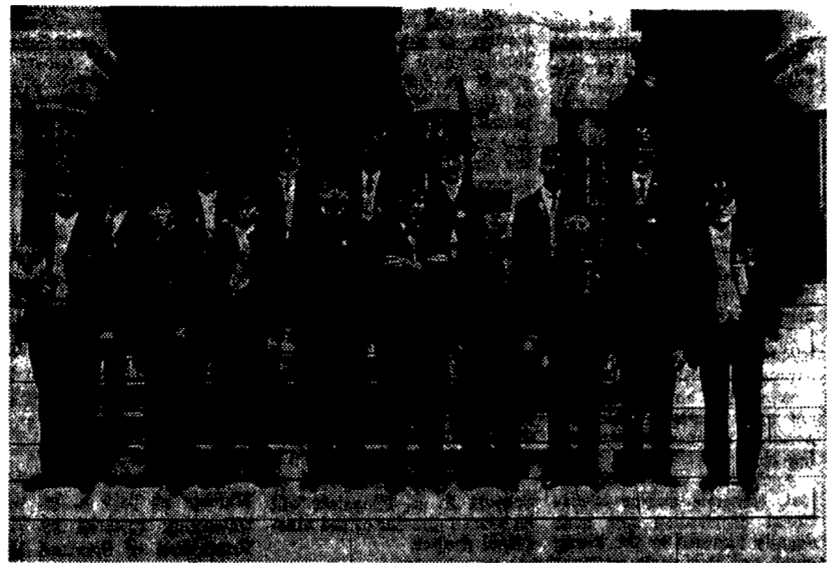
Don't forget the Methodist Men's annual auction which is being held at John Lytle's June 24.

The Norwood-Norfolk varsity baseball team, under the direction of Coach Ray Miller, completed their 1965 season with an overall record of 12 wins and two defeats. The Millermen finished second in Section 10 playoff competition after coping first place in the Western Division of the Northern League. This is by far the most successful record compiled by a baseball team at NNCS in several years. It is also the top winning percentage of any team in either division of the Northern League.

Hann, Kelly Awarded Citations For Services

Richard Hann and Francis Kelly of the Norwood-Norfolk Central School were honored by the N-N Central School Board on June 15 at the annual school meeting. Citations were presented to them by Dr. Henry Vinicor, presiding of the School Board, in recognition of their services as chief school administrators on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the American Association of School Administrators.

This professional organization made up of 17,000 school administrators, was founded in 1865 at Harrisburg, Pa. They have produced superior work, resulting in an excellent school, excellent instruction to students, and an economical use of the taxpayer's dollar.

Success Key The key to NNCS success this year was a combination of strong pitching and solid hitting. Craig Mahoney and Ron Brothers proved to be outstanding moundmen for Coach Miller this season. Mahoney compiled an overall record of 7 wins in 8 mound appearances this season, including a 6 to 0 record in league play. This raised Mahoney's three-year varsity pitching record to 16 wins and 2 defeats, the top percentage among Northern League hurlers. Ronnie Brothers compiled a record of 5 wins and 1 defeat, including a brilliant no-hit shut out against Canton.

Craig Mahoney also led the "Flying N's" in hitting with two home runs and a .438 batting average. Junior catcher Rod Woodward also hit over the .400 mark, as he swatted the ball at a .401 pace. The team batting average is Craig Mahoney, .436; Rod Woodward, .401; Dick Walker, .363; Terry McDougall, .325; Mike Edwards, .314; Roger Gray, .260; Gary Flinders, .243; Tim LaMay, .220; Allen McLaughlin, .178.

Next year's squad will be weakened due to the loss of six seniors from the starting line-up. These seniors are Craig Mahoney, Dick Walker, Tim LaMay, Mike Edwards, Allen McLaughlin, and Terry McDougall. Ronnie Brothers and Terry Steinburg will also be lost due to graduation.
