

VA Requests More Benefits

James E. Pigott, Manager of Veterans Administration Regional Office, Syracuse has announced that increased benefits for disabled veterans vocational rehabilitation and war orphans educational assistance have been advocated by William J. Driver, Administrator of Veteran Affairs, before a House sub-committee.

The increased cost of the two programs would be about \$23.5 million over a five-year period. Pigott said that the Administration had also urged that the present deadline for termination of vocational rehabilitation training be extended by 10 years.

Long term psychiatric patients now being benefited by developments in the psychiatric field, may thus be able to receive this training, although their present deadline has long since expired. The extension would apply not only to totally disabled veterans, but to all veterans whose disabilities have become so severe as to prevent them from performing the occupation for which they were previously trained.

In an appearance before a House committee a few weeks ago, Driver had urged that compensation payments to veterans disabled in service should be increased by about \$130 million annually. Pigott pointed out that the suggested increase is 20 percent for vocational rehabilitation allowances, now ranging from \$65 to \$120 monthly. There has been no increase in these allowances since 1948.

Pigott said that increased education expenses over the years have made the present orphans education allowance no longer commensurate with the benefit contemplated by Congress when it established the program in 1956.

Criteria
Both Dr. Kaplan and Superintendent Kingston have stressed that Operation Head Start is not a welfare project, strictly speaking. There is however an income criteria by which eligibility is adjudged. Any interested person may easily determine whether his or her child is eligible by calling any of the persons listed in this story and stating family income and number of children in the household.

The emphasis in Operation Head Start is on thorough physical examinations, with follow-up remedial attention to physical needs; a careful program of parent education; and an informal program to promote the general development of the child.

According to Dr. Julius Richmond, federal director of Project Head Start, the development of a child is dependent upon adequate health supervision and tender, stimulating care.

Authorities agree that social, economic and/or educational deprivation are each equally harmful to the young child, and that early patterns of learning and participation with other children, both singly and in groups, help to establish both behavioural and educational tendencies for the future.

There will be one paid Aide for each room and teacher, but Kingston stressed that Operation Head Start must rely heavily on volunteer help for many services.

Some of the work will go beyond helping at class sessions, for Project Head Start is a program which combines health, education and welfare services. For example, parents may need guidance in buying and preparing food which is inexpensive and yet nutritious. Children may have to be taken to medical and dental appointments, since the success of the program will depend heavily on follow-ups

of medical examinations. Norwood-Norfolk

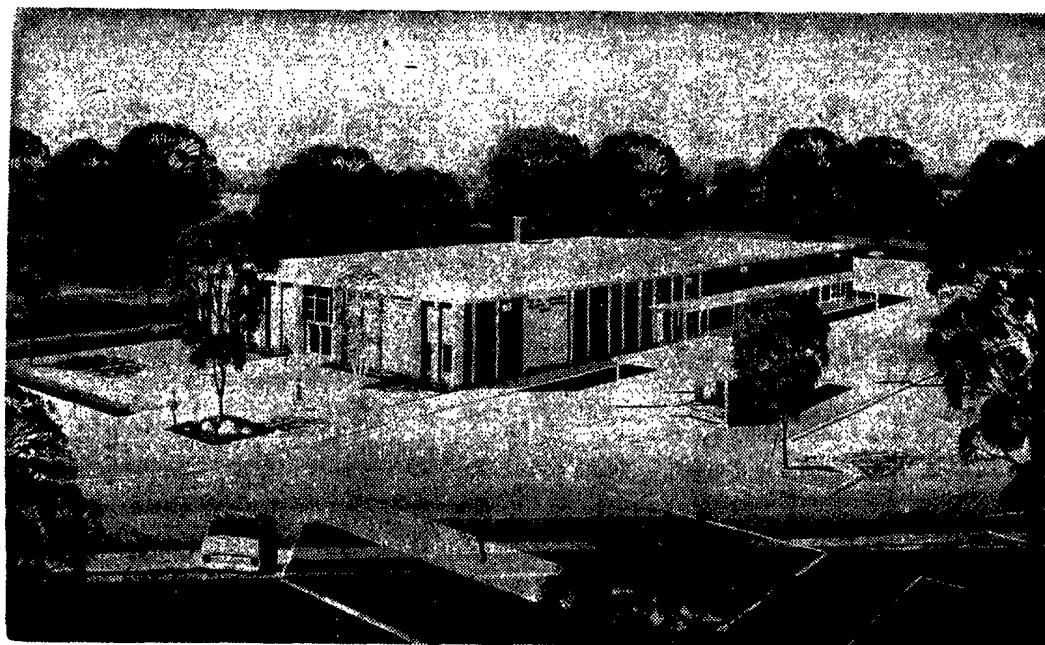
