

### PCS Trackmen Find It Rough In Sectionals

With the local Sandstoners coming through with some outstanding performances in one of the sternest competitive challenges of the season, Section 10 (Potsdam, OFA, Gouverneur, Massena, and Malone) defeated Section 7 (Peru, Plattsburgh, Beekmantown, Keaysville, Molra, and Teondoroga) by a score of 164½ to 120½. Potsdam led the way five intersectional winners, OFA and Gouverneur had three and Massena one for the Section 10. Peru notched three firsts for Section 7.

Peru and Potsdam led their respective sections in team scoring. Peru team garnered 57 points while Plattsburgh totaled 26½ for Section 7. Potsdam netted the most points for Section 10 totaling 58 while OFA furnished 47½ Gouverneur 31, Massena 20½ and Malone 12½. It was a nice win for Section 10 athletes who lost by a close margin last year. The Section 10 scoring system placed equal value on all events including relays; 8-5-3-2-1 for first through fifth places.

**Strong Runners**  
Sandstoners who won for Section 10 were three strong runners who in triumph finished the entire season undefeated. This feat was accomplished by senior Bill Putnam who took the 220 in 22.9, junior David Henderson who won the 440 in 53.4 and junior Steve Wray in the mile run in the record time of 4.43. Also, outside of being disqualified when finishing first in the Van Dusen, Earl Cooklin was undefeated throughout the entire season in the 180-yard low hurdles. (Cooklin could not run the hurdles in the intersectionals because of the disqualification in the Section 10 meet.)

Both of Potsdam's relay teams were victorious. The mile medley team pulled the biggest upset of the day when they defeated the Van Dusen medley winner, Malone, by two full strides. Bud Rose led off and got the Bright Orange, the lead in the 440 leg. Rose was clocked in 54.3 at the handoff. Mike Perry and Khee Park added some precious yardage in their 220's and then Ed Cummings ran a beautiful race in the 880 for the victory, despite a valiant effort by Malone's top runner, Pat Ryan. Cummings had his best time of the season and very good for the Plattsburgh track—2:05.8.

Proving that last week's upset win over the "Burr" in the Van Dusen was not to be reckoned with the Sandstoner ½ mile relay crew of LaDuke, Cooklin, Bell and Putnam came through once again but this time the hard way. Collaborating with precision handoffs and an outstanding leg by Bill Putnam in the anchoring position, the team overcame both OFA and a five-unit from Peru for the win. Putnam's come-from-behind performance over OFA's LeMaitre and Hall of Peru was quite a feat as Bill had just won the 220-yard dash 10 minutes before the relay was run-off. For Putnam and Cooklin it was a fitting climax to their track careers at Potsdam. LaDuke and Bell will be back to lead the Sandstoners next year.

**Bell Finishes Second**  
Harry Bell rose to the occasion for Section 10 in the 100-yard dash. He finished second with his fastest time of the season—10.2. He was nosed out by Hall of Peru. Khee Park also got his fastest
