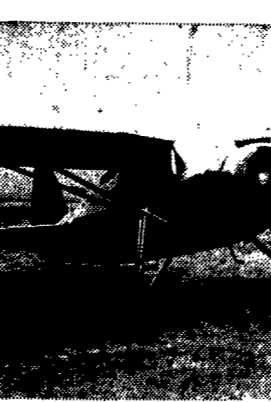

A June 26 wedding is planned.

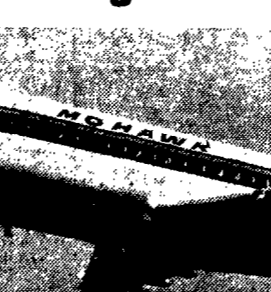

## Idaho Roundup Scouts Listed

Three Potsdam High School students will be delegates to the 1965 Girl Scout Senior Round Up to be held from July 15 through 28, at Farragut, Idaho. Attending from Potsdam are: Marijo Charlesbois, Marguerite Balukjian, and Sally Elliott. Alternates include: Mary Jane Brown, Bonnie McKenna, Karen Kent and Ann Kearns.

Round-Up will be a city of 5,000 tents, 9,000 girls and 2,000 adults, located on 5,000 acres on the shore of Lake Pend Oreille, which is 50 miles east of Spokane, Wash.

The Potsdam delegates will leave Syracuse by train on July 12, and the return trip, which includes a tour of Yellowstone National Park and Chicago, will end on July 31. Each patrol is composed of eight girls, and each patrol is responsible for demonstrating a skill peculiar to its area.

Marijo Charlesbois is patrol leader of the Northern Pathfinder Patrol which will demonstrate how to make snow shoes.

Marguerite Balukjian and Sally Elliott are members of the International Patrol which includes two girls from Belgium... Jacqueline Van de Maein and Hendrika Joris-Elisa De Wilde. The International Patrol will demonstrate soap making, a special type of soap which was smuggled across the United States-Canadian border many years ago.

There will be an encampment for the Alternates of New York State with representatives from several other states from July 19-28 at Camp Drum. Mary Jane Brown, patrol leader of our northern New York Patrol, reports that their demonstration will be hand-frozen ice cream from the dairy country.

Several villages in our area have been very generous in helping the Round-Up delegates and alternates acquire the necessary camping equipment.
