**Ice Cream Social**

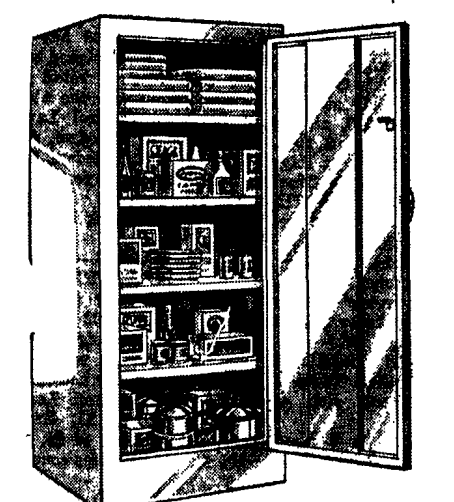
