

New Adult Education Program Offered Here

A program in basic education for adults will be offered under the Adult Education Program at Potsdam Central School. Scheduled to begin July 6, this program is open to all adults who are interested in improving their reading and arithmetic skills and is made possible by the Economic Opportunity Act.

Actually there are two programs in one. The Welfare Program which began at the school and ran for almost a full school year from Sept. 10 to May 21 is open to welfare recipients and enables them to improve their education. The newer part of the program involves educating anyone who wishes to learn.

William Eldridge, 8 Broad St., Potsdam, who is presently supervisor of practice teachers at the State University College at Potsdam will be the supervisor of the program which will be held daily from 8 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. and will end on Aug. 18. It is expected that those persons enrolling will be broken down into three or four groups based upon their reading ability.

Alan Jones, Mrs. Alice Matott, and Mrs. Kathleen Steinberg are the teachers who will each teach all the courses in one particular group level. The courses in the summer program will be more concentrated in certain areas than those subjects taught during the school year. Persons may enter from any area, but it is expected that most will be commuting from parts of St. Lawrence County. Since this will be the only program operating in the County this summer, many students will come from similar programs in other schools.

Any persons interested in taking this program should contact Kenneth Daniels, director of Adult Education, at the Potsdam High School. It will be necessary for each applicant to arrange for a personal interview prior to July 6 to determine which group he should be enrolled in.

Many adults who were refused admission into the Armed Forces or into Manpower Training Programs may find it possible to improve their skills sufficiently in this type of a program to be able to meet the necessary requirements.

In this past year's program which involved only welfare recipients 27 out of 50 persons remained in the program at the end of the year and 10 of these 27 students were in an upper grade level. It is important to note that not all of the drop-outs were because of lack of interest. Some of the students had transportation or family problems and were forced to leave the program. Also the number of 27 persons who remained in the program is according to the average. It is expected that there will not be as many drop-outs during the summer months because of the short duration of the program and good driving conditions.

The program is structured to take people only to the eighth grade, but because of individual situation, four in the recently-completed program were able to go beyond and get their high school diplomas. Many of those who have completed the program now have employment. Some will enter the service and many plan to enter the Manpower Training Program. Some of the students will be coming back to school to complete the course.
