\$3.68 Was May Farm Milk Price

A uniform farm price of \$3.68 per hundredweight (46.5 quarts) will be paid for milk delivered to pool plants in the New York - New Jersey milkshed in May, it was announced by Dr. A. J. Pollard, acting market administrator. The April farm price was \$3.87 and the May, 1964, price was \$3.62.

The May producer butterfat differential will be computed at the rate of six cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above or below the 3.5 percent standard.

Milk production in May was at a record high of 1,191,567,028 pounds. This was 3,615,415 pounds over the previous record of 1,187,951,613 pounds established in May, 1964. Sales of fluid milk (Class 1) totaled 482,989,549, a decrease of 226,038 pounds from the total of 483,215,587 pounds a year ago.

Handlers paid \$4.59 per hundredweight for milk received in the 201-210 mile zone and sold as fluid in May. Class 1 milk made up 40.5 percent of May pool. This compared with 40.7 percent in 1964.

The number of dairy farmers producing for the May pool was 40,179, or a decrease of 2,175 from the total a year ago of 42,354. Deliveries per day, per dairy, however, increased 62 pounds going from 905 pounds last year to 957 pounds this year. The number of handlers' reports used in computing the pool decreased by 25 to 290.

Receipts at bulk tank units increased 62,631,285 pounds from 414,825,295 in 1964 to 477,457,120 pounds. The number of unit producers was 10,649, a gain of 1,038 over the total of 9,611 a year ago. There were 303 bulk tank units this year, two more than in May, 1964.

Bulk tank milk accounted for 40.1 percent of the May pool, compared with 34.9 percent last year.

Dr. Pollard reported the farm value of the May pool at \$45,100,646.17. This, however, does not include all differentials paid to dairy farmers.

The uniform price of \$3.68 per hundredweight will be paid for milk testing 3.5 percent butterfat and received within 201-210 miles of New York City.

Dr. Kaplan Stresses Advantage Of Group Therapy At ARC Meet

More than half the mentally retarded children in our country are undiscovered, it was revealed at the recent meeting held in Canton by the St. Lawrence County Chapter, National Association for Retarded Children.

"The clinics, the doctors, the teachers and others interested in helping can only do so, if they learn about the children through the parents," Dr. Deborah Kaplan, Potsdam, said.

Dr. Kaplan, a pediatrician, is a member of the Board of Directors for the coming year and presided at the meeting until the election of officers took place.

"If only parents could learn what help is available, not be ashamed to ask for it, and realize what the rights of their child are, they would have greater peace of mind, and comfort from one another. This organization serves primarily to aid the retarded child from birth, if known, until he or she has received everything possible to enable fitting into society."

Dr. Kaplan stressed the group therapy possible from parents meeting with other parents of retarded children. Most of those at the meeting were parents and professionals in the field of retardation.

During the evening more than 80 persons gathered in the social hall of the Unitarian-Universalist Church in Canton to discuss the new County organization. Five local units have also been formed to handle education and training centers in Massena, Canton, Potsdam, Ogdensburg and Gouverneur.

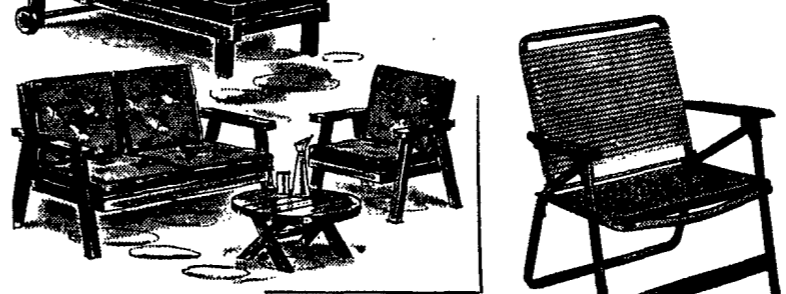

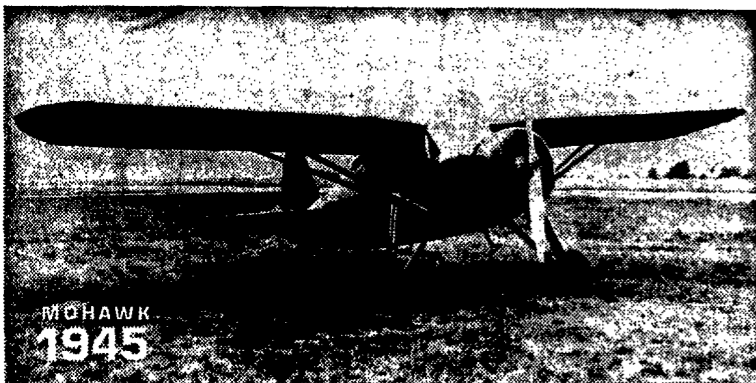

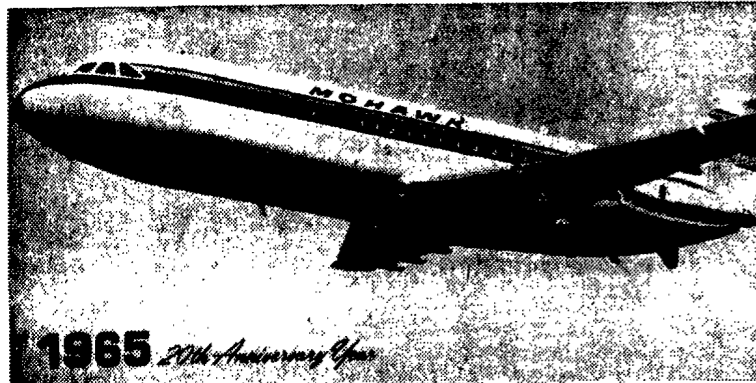
