

## Eastern Producers Welcome Affiliates

The official welcoming of 1,000 new dairymen from the Allied Federated Cooperatives of Northern New York, a panel of marketing specialists from throughout the East, dairy princesses and a special message to the Secretary of Agriculture highlighted the 44th annual meeting of Eastern Milk Producers Cooperative Association, June 8 and 9 at the Hotel Syracuse.

The affiliation signing between Allied and Eastern had taken place several weeks ago, but the Eastern delegates' unanimous approval of a by-law change to permit two Allied members on the board made the move official.

Some 500 delegates and other Eastern members, and wives were on hand for the annual affair which was climaxed with a banquet attended by over 800 persons.

After a unanimous resolution from the membership, a telegram was sent to Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman urging him to take a "first-hand" look at areas in the Northeast which were stricken by drought in 1964 and are again suffering from drought in 1965.

Miss Wilma Lea Blevins of Arkansas, American Dairy Princess; Miss Marjorie Heath, Chicago Forks, New York State Dairy Princess; and Miss Rosa Lee Morse, Canton, Pa., Pennsylvania Dairy Princess were honored guests at the annual meeting.

### Agway Executive On N-M Board

Syracuse—Edmund H. Fallon, executive vice president and general manager of Agway, Inc., and a leader in national and state agricultural affairs, has been elected to the Board of Directors of Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation, it was announced by Earle J. Machold, president.

Agway, with headquarters in Syracuse, was formed last year through a merger of Cooperative Grange League Federation Exchange, Inc., and the Eastern States Farmers' Exchange. The organization has farmer-members in all of the New England states, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Ohio and a sales volume in excess of \$320 million a year.

Fallon was born and brought up on a 300-acre dairy farm in Westville. He was graduated in mechanical engineering from Clarkson College of Technology and then started work as manager of a GLF Exchange store in Watertown. Progressing through various jobs, he was called to the Hibara headquarters in 1938 to develop a petroleum department. He was named general manager of GLF in 1957. Following the merger he was elected to his present position in which he directs one of the largest farmer-owned organizations in the country.

Fallon is a director of the farm foundation; Chicago; the Foundation for American Agriculture, Washington, D.C.; New York State Traffic Safety Council; and the First Trust & Deposit Company and the Metropolitan Development Association, Syracuse.
