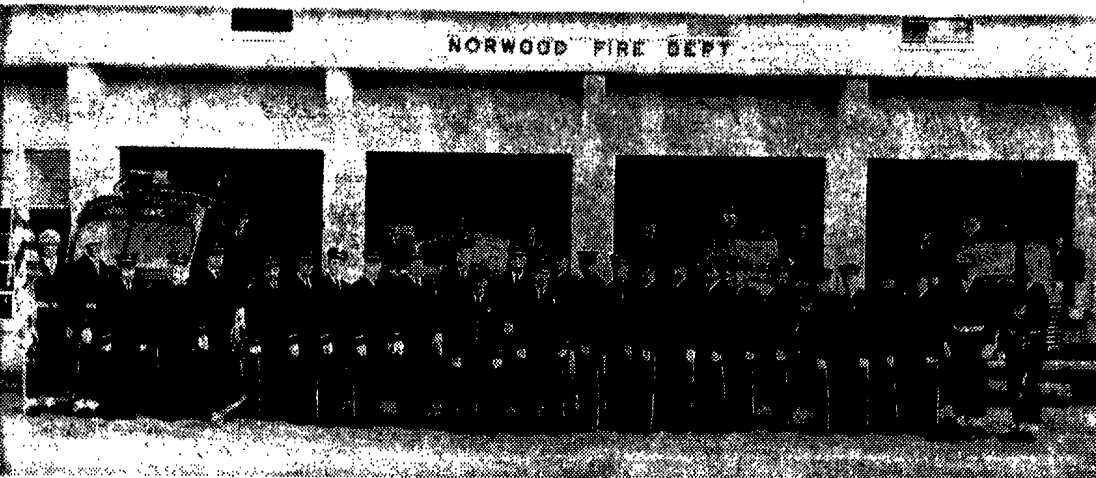

Annual July 4 Celebration Planned

Norwood Volunteer Fire Department will sponsor their 28th annual July 4th celebration on Monday, July 5. The first event, scheduled for 9 a.m., and opening a full day and evening program, is the firemen's racing team competition in the long ladder, motor hose C, long hose motor replacement and bucket race. Eleven Northern New York racing teams are planning to enter these races.

During the time the races are in progress, there will be rides for the kiddies in the village park.

The ladies of the Louisville Auxiliary will serve a roast beef dinner in the Municipal Building from 11 a.m. until all are served.

The parade will form on Baldwin Avenue and will march promptly at 2 p.m. according to Wayne Fielding, parade chairman. It is expected that 24 area Fire Departments, eight bands, seven floats, American Legion Drill Teams from Massena, Brush-ton-Moira, and Norwood, several Auxiliaries, Scouts and Legionnaires will be in the line of march which will cross Main Street and up Spring Street, across Pleasant Street and up Sports Avenue to the

hall park.

A ladies softball game is set for 3 p.m. when the ladies meet the Derby. There will be rides, games, bingo and a concert by the Firemen's Band during the afternoon. The "Sunny Mountain Boys," a popular group in this area, will entertain in the evening prior to the fireworks which will commence at dark. In event of rain, the fireworks will be held on the first clear night. There will be a drawing for \$350.00 in cash prizes.

The business section of Norwood will be blocked off from 9 a.m. until 12 p.m. and from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and traffic will be routed around that section during those hours.

From the plans made by Chief Lyle Camp and his committee, this year's celebration promises to be the biggest and best ever.

Acts Of Vandalism In Village Deplored

No longer can we complacently and self-righteously take when learning of acts of senseless vandalism and wanton destruction occurring in neighboring communities because we have IT in our midst.

Consider:

● The utter destruction wrought upon the home of a hard-working young couple, a home which had been modernized through self-sacrifice of the owners. Small boys, said by a police justice to be in the kindergarten to third or fourth grade age level, welded an axe smashing cupboards, counter tops, broke electrical appliances, clock, portions of the stove and other things. I purposely did not ask the identity of these children when I was told that the parents were to be compelled to make financial restitution.

● A nice young tree born by its roots out of the lawn of a man who has always supported every project for the benefit of Norwood's young people.

● The destruction of the flower and vegetable garden which was the pride and joy of an elderly retired gentleman who has always been a friend to all young people.

● The destruction of the frame of an expensive tent in the yard of a man who has spent countless hours working on youth recreation projects assisted by his wife who has been ever ready to chauffeur or plan ways and means to better the youth program; another tent in another yard was also a target for the unwelcome attention of "somebody".

● The horrible marring and obscene writing on the walls of the Norwood Elementary School last summer—did the already overburdened taxpayers, uninformed of the vandalism, pay to repair this damage? I don't know. I have been told by reliable authority that some of the youths who were involved in this incident, perpetrated a similar deed in another town.

● The Norwood Historical Association History Room broken into twice within a few weeks—the door broken, locks and casings torn from the wall.

● Walls on the lower floor of the Municipal Building damaged and considerable destruction in a wash room and the battery on a fire truck run down. These were reported some months ago when they came to light at a meeting of the Village Board.

● A portion of the floor of the village handstand has been torn up.

● Numerous incidents of disturbances at teen-age dances held in the Municipal Building. These are said to be caused mainly by out-of-towners.

I have been told that these recent vandalic acts have been committed during late night and early morning hours.

Let someone say "there is nothing in Norwood for the children to do", let me hasten to remind my readers of the large enrollment of both boys and girls in 4-H, scouting, various church groups for young people, planned summer recreation of basketball, volleyball, softball, tennis and swimming; Vacation Church School; Story Hour and Reading Club sponsored by the Norwood Library; for boys, pee wee hockey and baseball, Babe Ruth baseball, and winter basketball. All of these activities are open to any and all of our youth absolutely without charge. Adults GIVE their time to carry out these activities.

Can it be that all this mischief is done by a few not in these programs by their own choice? Local law enforcement officers tell me that, according to new legislation, parents of children guilty of vandalism are financially responsible for their child's misdeeds and that they intend property owners in Norwood will have the protection of this statute. — S.L.
