PCS Athletes Capture Five NL Championships

Potsdam Central School has just completed the finest athletic year in the history of the school, according to Director Hal Gillette. Playing in the strong Northern League, Potsdam captured five championships.

Starting the year in September, Coach Ted Strafford's football team emerged as co-champs, with a record of 6-1. This was the first football championship for the school in 35 years.

During the winter season Coach Mel Tomalty's hockey forces had a fine 16-4 record finishing 2nd in league play plus copping the St. Lawrence and Lake Placid tournaments.

The slick-fielding senior from Elmont, led the Bears in RBI's by driving in 13 runs in 17 games, while posting a .267 batting average.

Cuccinello, co-captain of the 1965 squad, was one of only four seniors on coach John Dennett's Bear nine, which compiled a 5-12 season mark.

Home Economists Encourage Safety

Falls are responsible for over 40 per cent of the fatal home accidents. Slippery surfaces, poor lighting, lack of handrails, unanchored rugs, clutter, and rips or tears in carpeting or flooring surfaces are mechanical causes of falls.

Human factors such as haste, poor eyesight, physical frailty, or poor judgement that cause falls are related to the mechanical factors.
