Negotiations have been completed for the acquisition of the Paul Smith's Electric Light and Power and Railroad Company by Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation, according to a joint announcement by the two utilities. The transfer of ownership, to be effected by an exchange of common stock, is subject to approval by regulatory commissions.

Niagara Mohawk and Paul Smith's College, owner of the Northern New York utility, have been negotiating the terms of the change in ownership for more than a year.

The Paul Smith's Electric Company, with headquarters at Saranac Lake, serves about 5,000 customers in parts of St. Lawrence, Franklin, Clinton and Essex Counties.
