from the PAMPERED KITCHEN

It has been said that to eat is a necessity, but to enjoy eating is one of life's greatest pleasures. The hours we spend preparing food in the kitchen can be brief or lengthy, boring or rewarding.

To some families dinner has become a meat and potato rut. To deviate from this combination would be unthinkable. Furthermore, chicken must always be deep-fried, apples must always be served as pie, potatoes must always be mashed, and lemon pie must always be topped with meringue. Some homemakers boast they never use a recipe, because there is nothing new in food.

Recipes are not only tickets to adventures in eating, but are also inspirations to both the cook and her captive customers. There is always a new dish, a different ingredient, a better method, an unthought-of combination, and a forgotten flavor.

Today's modern homemaker has so many advantages. She has a kitchen staffed by such mechanical servants as electric timers, blenders, controlled burners, electric mixers, and an endless variety of pans, casseroles, and skillets, some with non-stick surfaces. To further assist her are instant foods, many of which can be the basis of more elaborate concoctions, requiring little of the effort of years ago.

Today's kitchen is truly a pampered one. The benefits

are yours to enjoy if you are willing to prepare something new and if your family is willing to consider eating an adventure.

The following lemon pie utilizes a time-saving crumb crust and frozen lemonade concentrate, one of the modern convenience ingredients. The lemony tang and the delicate pink tint make this a welcome dessert for hot-weather appetites.

Pink Lemonade Pie
1 Graham wafer crust
1 can (6-oz.) frozen pink lemonade concentrate, undiluted
1 bottle (7-oz.) lemon-lime carbonated beverage
¼ teaspoon salt

1 package (10½-oz.) miniature marshmallows
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1. Prepare crumb crust for a 9-inch pie.
2. Combine lemonade concentrate and the lemon-lime beverage in a saucepan.
3. Add salt, and bring lemonade mixture just to the boiling point.
4. Remove from heat and add marshmallows, stirring until melted. (Use a blender, if available.)
5. Chill, stirring occasionally, until slightly thickened.
6. Fold in the whipped cream, and pour filling into the pie shell. (Any extra filling should be chilled in a separate bowl.)
7. Either chill or freeze until firm.
