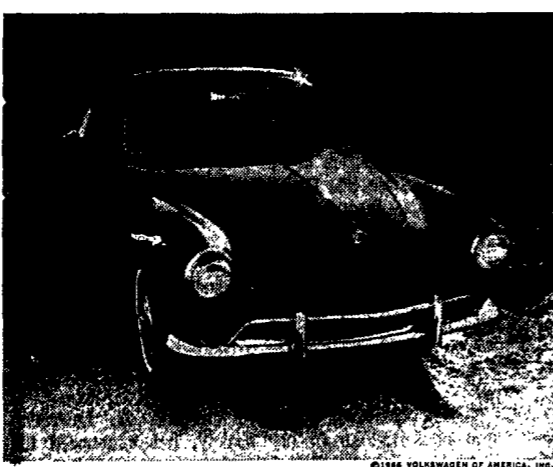
Reeves receives BA from U of Rochester
