Wadhams Hall

to offer 4-Year B.A. Program

His Excellency, the Most Rev. Thomas A. Donnellan, D. D., Bishop of Ogdensburg and President of the Board of Trustees of Wadhams Hall, has released the following information. On June 24th the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York met in Albany and voted to amend the charter of Wadhams Hall authorizing the corporation to conduct a 4-year liberal art program leading to a bachelor of arts (B.A.) degree.

The Rector of Wadhams Hall, the Right Rev. Msgr. Floyd J. Brown, stated that the 3rd year liberal arts curriculum with a major in philosophy will be offered on campus at Wadhams Hall during the 1966-67 academic year. In the following scholastic year the 4th year curriculum will be initiated leading to a bachelor of arts degree for qualified students in June 1968. Seminars, therefore, will earn their B. A. degrees before beginning the study of theology.

Since July 10, 1962 Wadhams Hall has been registered by the University of the State of New York as a Junior College of Liberal Arts. The present charter from the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York, raising the status of Wadhams Hall to that of a Senior College, marks another step in the development and expansion of Wadhams Hall Seminary which was founded by the Most Reverend Joseph H. Conroy in September 1924.

Monsignor Brown pointed out that the expanded curriculum will result in another substantial increase in student enrollment and faculty members at Wadhams Hall.
