NY Chamber of Commerce hails Medicaid's 1st Deductible Feature

The Empire State Chamber of Commerce hailed as a "first necessary step toward developing a meaningful and manageable program" the adoption by the Legislature of an initial deductible feature in the new State Medical Assistance plan, and estimated potential savings up to \$100 million.

John J. Roberts, Executive Vice President of the Chamber, noted that inclusion of a deductible amount to be spent by prospective beneficiaries under the plan prior to receipt of aid had been part of the State Chamber's program. He estimated that this step alone could reduce the overall cost by up to \$100 million.

"If we assume that of the 40% of our population, or eight million persons, eligible under the original plan, two million would receive medical

attention — and medical assistance — during this first year of operation, and if we assume a minimum savings of \$50 per claimant through the deductible, either in out-of-pocket or medical insurance costs, then \$100 million is not an exaggerated estimate," he stated.

"The Chamber hopes that inclusion of a deductible feature will be only the first step toward developing a meaningful and manageable program which will insure care for our medically indigent while preserving the fiscal integrity of our State and local governments."

"We trust that the 1967 Legislature and the Governor will approve other Chamber recommendations directed toward this same end," Mr. Roberts continued. "We would still like

IRS lists New Payroll News

District Director Donald T. Hartley of the Albany Internal Revenue Service which services Northeastern New York State announced that under new Treasury regulations issued May 17, employers who have more than \$4,000 of payroll taxes in any month of the

preceding calendar quarter are required to make twice monthly deposits of these taxes in a Federal Reserve Bank or a designated commercial bank.

The deposits are required to be made within three banking days after the 15th and last day of each month. Formerly deposits by these employers were made once a month.

The District Director said that affected employers must deposit social security and withheld taxes for the last half of June 66 by July 6, 1966.

The new rules allow employers, within limits, to make estimated deposits to comply with the new requirements.

The new requirements are considered met, IRS said, if a deposit for the semi-monthly period is at least 90 percent of total taxes for the period or if the semi-monthly deposit is 45 percent of total taxes for the month. The 45 percent alternative rule cannot be used by employers normally paying more than 75 percent of their wages in the first half of the month.

Employers not affected by the new rules continue to deposit or pay social security and withheld income taxes as they have in the past.
