

# Treadway Wing to house SLU Golf & Country Club

A newly completed wing of the University Treadway Inn will be dedicated on Sunday with a band concert and an open house in the afternoon. The public is invited to attend and tour the facilities until 5 p. m. Light refreshments will be served.

The Canton summer band will give a concert at 2 p. m. Mayor Stanton B. Smith of Canton will speak at the 3 p. m. dedication ceremonies. Also participating will be officials of the University Inn Corporation which owns the Inn, the Treadway Inns Corporation which operates the Inn, and St. Lawrence University. Dr. Edwin B. Smith, president of the St. Lawrence Golf and Country Club will also take part in the ceremonies.

The new addition to the Inn will house the St. Lawrence Golf and Country Club in the summer months. During the winter it will be available for banquets, meetings, receptions and seminars. The addition will give the Inn's two dining rooms a seating capacity of 350 persons.

The new dining room, named the Laurentian Room, will accommodate 200 persons for banquets. It has a vaulted ceiling and exposed beams, and its wood siding was obtained from storage barns located in St. Lawrence County. A new cocktail lounge has been named the Rushton Room after Canton's famous builder of canoes. It affords a view of the putting green, driving range and swimming pool.

Three new holes are under construction on the existing St. Lawrence University golf course. The first tee and the ninth green will be adjacent to the Inn, allowing players to start and finish the nine-hole course from the new clubhouse, which will provide expanded locker rooms and storage facilities. Golf club members have a private lounge and service bar overlooking the first tee.

Also included in the outdoor construction are a full-size driving range with sand trap and bunker and a practice green with sand traps. White silica sand was shipped from Pennsylvania for all of the traps on the course. Architect for the course and for the new of Fiddler's Green, Mass. holes was Godfrey Cornish Findley and Hall of Old Forge were the contractors. A path has been built from the Inn to the University riding arena and stable, and guests of the Inn will be able to use this new facility.

William Prescott of Keeseville was the architect for both the new wing and for the original Inn which opened in July 1962. Antique brick and barn wood siding are used extensively to carry forward the Early American theme. Black hand-wrought iron chandeliers and candle torch wall sconces were imported from Mexico to lend authenticity to the Spanish flavor of the dining room and cocktail lounge. Korean grass mat paper graces the hallway. In the cocktail lounge there are antique, hand-painted horse cart panels depicting knights-in-armor. Interior decoration was done by Mrs. Eleanor Allwork of New York City. General contractor for the con-

struction was Rupert Wager of Watertown.

The Inn's former cocktail lounge has been designated as the Remington Room and provides a sitting room for Inn guests. Many mementos and prints of Frederic Remington will be displayed. The famous painter of Western scenes was born in Canton and is buried in nearby Evergreen Cemetery.

Innkeeper of the 50-room University Treadway Inn is Peter B. Heinrich. He is a 1960 graduate of the University of Rochester and of Cornell University's School of Hotel Administration in 1963. He formerly was sales manager and assistant innkeeper of the Thousand Islands Club in Alexandria Bay.

Treadway Inns Corporation, founded in 1912, operates the University Treadway Inn as part of its family of 25 coun-

ty inns, resorts and motor inns. It offers New England dishes and regional specialties.

Officers of the St. Lawrence Golf and Country Club besides Dr. Smith are Frank J. Mace, vice president; and Leonard H. Haag, treasurer. Lester Rawlins is chairman of the greens committee. Miss Ann Kray is president of the Ladies Association, and Manley J. McKenney is chairman of the events committee. Directors include Richard J. Peggs, Robert J. Buehler, Dr. Ernest H. Stretton and Thomas A. Carroll.

The golf professional, Stan Mack, is a member of the P.G.A. and coaches the St. Lawrence University golf team. During the winter he is a teaching professional at the Fort Lauderdale Country Club.

## Urbanites visit Dairy Counties This Week

This is adventure week for 30 New York City milk drinkers who are delving into the mysteries of milk on 30 upstate dairy farms.

For most of the boys and girls — the Governor's Committee for Increased Use of Milk calls them "ambassadors" — it is the first time they have ever been on any kind of a farm. For a few it is the first time they have been more than 25 miles away from New York City.

The host families opened their homes to the Ambassadors so they could learn all about milk, how good and pure it is, how dairy farmers are leaders in their own communities, and then after a week of seeing for themselves can go home and become evangelists for milk in their schools and places of worship.

All of the visitors were chosen by their Junior High School principals because they are acknowledged leaders in their respective schools. Their farm visits, from July 19 to July 27, are also in return for the trip to New York City which the upstate Dairy Princesses made on June 14, smack in the middle of June Dairy Month.

Farmers will indoctrinate their guests in the art of milking by hand and machine. They will take them to milk plants, to church, on picnics and everything else the family does while the visits are in progress. This is Project Dairyland — 1966, an event sponsored by the Governor's Committee and financed entirely by the Metropolitan Dairy Institute, Eastern, Northeast, and Dairyman's League cooperatives, the Greater New York June Dairy Month Committee and assisted by American Dairy Association and the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets.

Wednesday (July 20) is the first full day for the Ambassadors in their new environments. Some of them spent long hours Tuesday on buses and in private cars reaching their destinations. Enroute they drank — you guessed it — milk. Counties entertaining them are Allegany, Broome,

Cattaraugus, Cayuga, Chautauque, Chemung (two hosts), Chenango (two hosts), Clinton, Cortland (three hosts), Delaware, Essex, Franklin, Greene, Herkimer, Jefferson, Lewis, Montgomery, Oneida, Onondaga, Otsego, Rensselaer, St. Lawrence, Seneca, Steuben, Tioga and Washington.

The visitors expect to be interviewed by news men interested in reactions to their new experiences. The 1965 delegation produced unusually good copy for all communications media. The current group is pledged to write about the trip for their school papers, talk about it in classes and churches and in other ways win new friends for the State's leading agriculture product.

Governor Rockefeller and State Agriculture Commissioner Wickham have described the project as great public relations for the milk industry made possible by the cooperation of New York City school officials, milk dealers and many public minded individuals.

## 5 Oswegatchie Schools merge with Ogdensburg

Voters in five Oswegatchie school districts voted last week to consolidate with the city of Ogdensburg school system. According to reports, the voters had two choices: consolidation now or take no action, in which case they would later be faced with the same important choice — whether to construct their own buildings or consolidate in accordance with the state's master plan.

Of the 400 eligible voters, some 163 actually cast ballots, with the following results: For consolidation now, 140; 22 were against and there was one void ballot.

The State will now assume an additional 25 percent of the cost of construction of new facilities at OPA. This 25%, in addition to regular state aid formulas, will bring the
