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Administrative Position filled

Ridley assumes Duties August 1

Douglas D. Ridley, 23 Randall Drive, Massena, will assume the duties of the newly created position of administrative assistant or business manager at Norwood-Norfolk Central School on Aug. 1 according to an announcement made Monday by Dr. Henry Vinickor, president of the Norwood - Norfolk Central School Board of Education.

Ridley received a Bachelor of Business Administration from Clarkson College of Technology in 1963 and since July of that year has been employed by the Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors Corporation at Massena, first in the Financial Department where he performed the duties of time office clerk, accounts payable clerk, cost accounting clerk and plant report clerk.

In May 1965 he transferred to College Graduate in Training production section where he received actual on-job training to become familiar with production problems and was later assigned to plant engineering and maintenance, cost saving analysis and maintenance suggestion appraisal.

Perpetual Inventory
In his new post he will be required to begin an inventory and maintain a perpetual inventory, be in charge of all purchasing and selling, be in over-all charge of all school maintenance, have charge of all non-teaching personnel, the buses, garage and cafeteria. He will be present at school board meetings and make an annual evaluation report on all non-teaching personnel employed by the school district.

The hiring of a business manager for the school will relieve Supervising Principal Richard W. Hann and Vice-Principal Francis W. Kelly of duties not usually performed by members of the teaching profession.

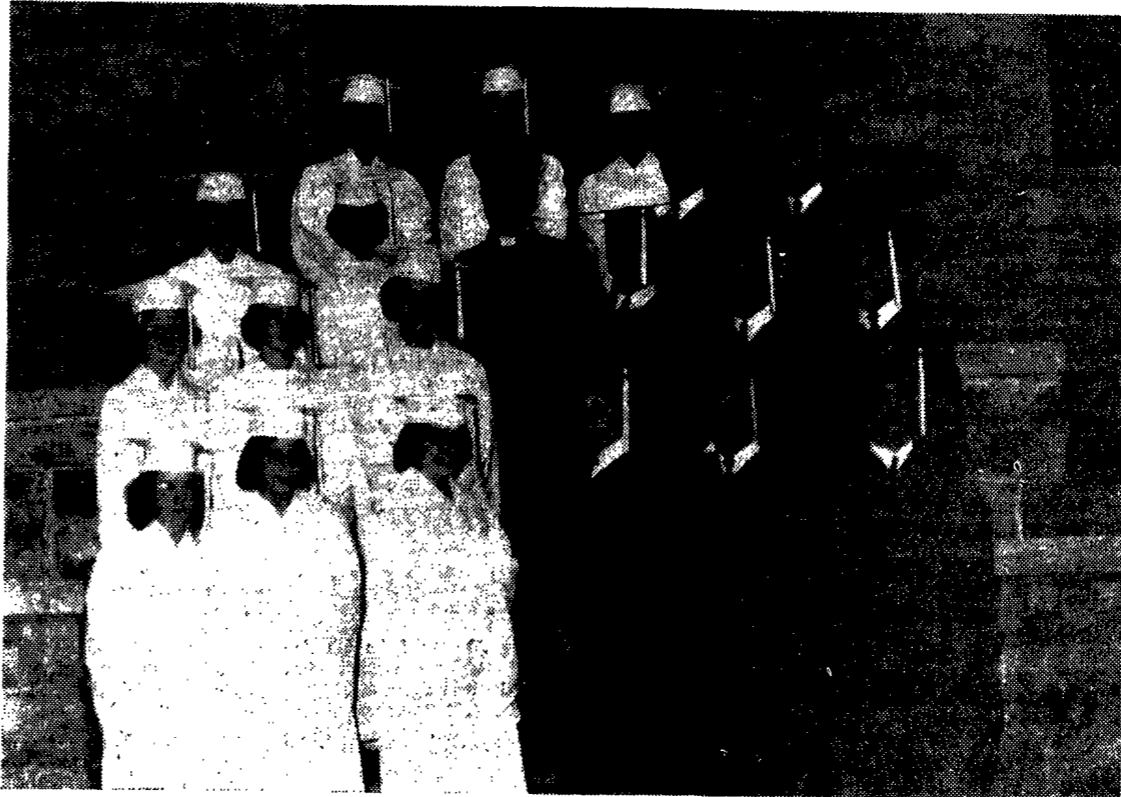
In the new set-up, as approved at the May 9, 1966 meeting of the Board, the Board of Education will get an annual evaluation report on all teachers and supervisors from Hann. Two times a year, in February and July, Hann will present to the Board a comparison of grades and re-graduate to previous years.

The Principal, Vice Principal and curriculum coordinators, grade school coordinators will visit at least one class per day and file a report on findings. In the past, time has not allowed Hann or Kelly to make enough classroom evaluations.

Kelly will be second in command of the school as heretofore and will have an opportunity to make classroom visits, supervise Guidance and spend more time in that field, and will now supervise all athletics and especially coaches and report three times a year on various teams and coaches. He will recommend any changes he deems desirable.

Senior Division All-Stars to meet Burlington Little Leaguers Tomorrow

Eighteen boys, 13, 14, and 15 years of age, members of the Senior Division of the Tri-Town Little League All Stars, will journey to Tupper Lake tomorrow to meet the Burlington, Vt. Little Leaguers at a game to be called at 6 p.m. in the Tupper Lake Municipal Ball Park. It is hoped that a sizeable motorcade will make the trip and provide moral support to the local lads.

This group is the first team of the Northern District of Little League to participate in such a game. The winners of

tomorrow's game will play in Glens Falls July 25 and will be hosted by the supporters of Little League in that community. The July 25 winning team plays at West Point July 27 and the winner of that game goes to White Plains July 30. The victor of this game will enter the Little League World Series at Williamsport, Pa. later in the summer.

Harry Whalen, president of the Tri-Town Little League, attended a Little League conference in Glens Falls four

days last week. He was elected Administrator of the 11th District Northern area, the largest district in Little League in the United States. This district encompasses all counties as far south as Saratoga.

Whalen said that the paramount aim of the Little League is to establish Little League in many more New York State communities. The Tri-Towns, Norfolk, Norwood, and Raymondville are but one of a few in St. Lawrence County to be affiliated with the group and their invitation to take part in the forthcoming tournament is a direct outgrowth of this.

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Supreme Court to decide Case of Village vs. St. Lawrence Gas

At the July 12 meeting of the Norwood Village Board Village Attorney Lee H. Turner told the Board members that he had been notified that the case of the Village of Norwood vs. The St. Lawrence Gas Company to recover the sum of \$1,765 for inspector's wages paid by the village is scheduled for trial in Supreme Court July 27. The Village of Norwood had customarily paid the wages of the man who had inspected the gas in-

stallations and was to be reimbursed by the gas company.

Joseph Tisdell of the consulting engineering firm of Aikens and Tisdell Associates was present at the meeting and discussed the New York State requirements for sewage treatment plants. No action was taken on acquiring a suitable site of land needed for the project.

Pfautz completing Summer Studies

Allan P. Pfautz of 64 North Main St., Norwood, a teacher at Norwood elementary school in Norwood, is completing study in a six-week summer institute at Monmouth College. The local resident was one of 27 teachers from across the nation chosen for the National Science Foundation-sponsored program.

The summer institute is geared for elementary mathematics and science teachers who work with student teachers. It began June 27 on the Monmouth campus under the direction of Dr. R. D. Boswell, Jr., professor of mathematics and chairman of the teacher education committee at Monmouth, and will end Aug. 5.

The two courses in the program, "Essentials of Mathematics" and "The Energy Concept," will carry 10 quarter hours of college credit and will be supplemented by seminars on new programs in mathematics and science. Grants averaging \$450 were awarded to the 27 applicants chosen for the program.

The institute is sponsored by a \$20,000 NSF grant to Monmouth College. Participants in the institute come from 12 states, including New Mexico, South Carolina, and New York, and also from the Virgin Islands.

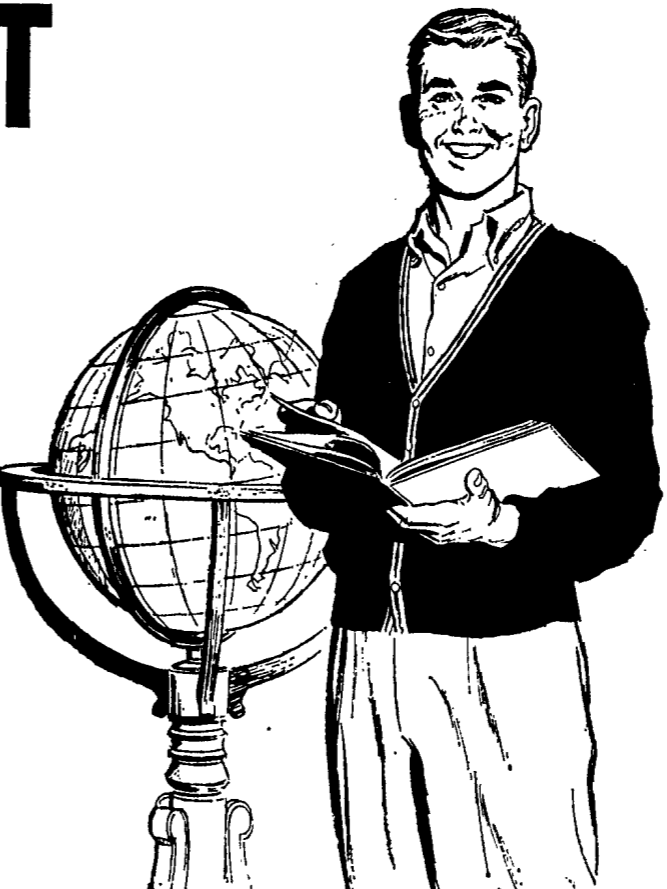
