

Sandstone Juniors turn in 19 - 3 Diamond Record

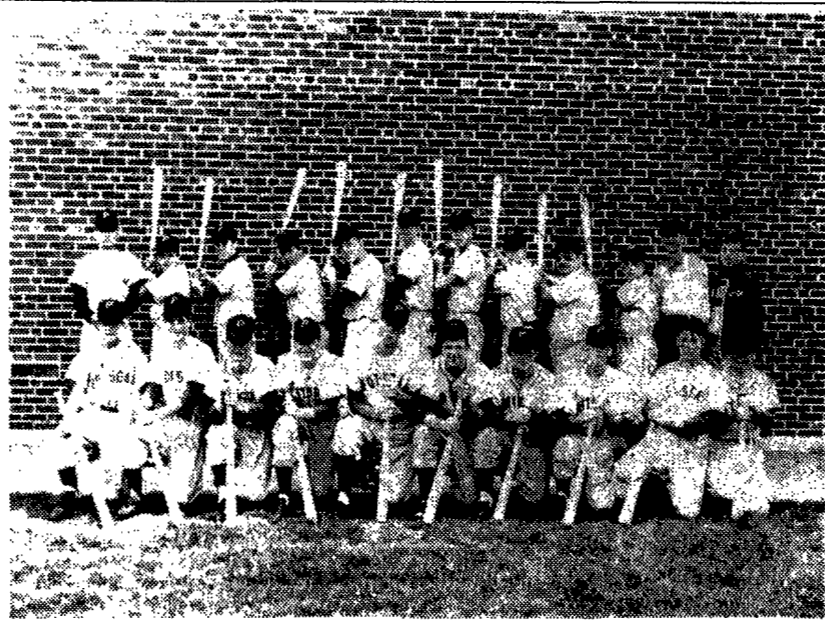
Potsdam's Junior Sandstone Juniors turned in an impressive overall record of 19-3, giving Coach Sherwood Smith a fine campaign. In Western Division play the team won the Northern League honors with a 10-2 record.

During the season the Stoner's team batted at an even .300 while holding the opposition to a meager .194 batting average. The top batsmen for Potsdam were Rance Benton with a solid .450 average which included four home runs, 25 runs batted in. He amassed 28 hits of which 9 were of the extra base variety. Benton also led the club in runs scored with 34. Craig Cox hit for a .373 average in his leadoff spot, and led the club with 23 stolen bases. Mike Murphy topped the club with 29 hits, including 12 extra base wallops and a .367 average. Murphy was accredited with 24 runs batted in, and led the club in fielding with a .976 average committing five errors in 22 games behind the plate.

John LaBrake hit .307 and batted in 18 markers, Tom Barrington batted .290 and batted in 15 runs. Doug Gorse had a batting mark of .267 and batted in 14 runs. John James fleet centerfielder was the only regular to hit under .250 but scored 19 runs with his dazzling speed and played well defensively. Tim Gerrish, freshman utility infielder hit for a .307 average. Peter Barney contributed to the team effort with several game winning hits, as did Al Gotsch who batted .263.

John LaBrake was the clubs top hurler with a pitching record of 12-3. His earned run average was a sparkling 1.80, striking out 135 batters while walking only 32. John pitched 13 complete games including three shutouts. In 93 innings pitched LaBrake allowed 68 hits. Doug Gorse compiled a neat 4-0 slate, whiffing 34 batters while walking 15. Bill Varner, freshmen righthander, aided his team effort with a 2-0 mark, including one shutout. Varner's earned run average of 1.37 led the pitching staff, he struck out 20 hitters while walking only 14. Tom Barrington relief hurler, compiled a 1-0 record in eight innings of hurling.

4-H Pony Clinic slated for Fair

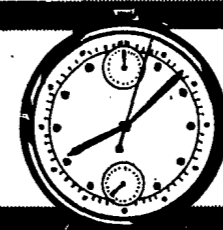
A 4-H all-breed pony clinic will be held at the New York State Exposition grounds on July 30, 1966, with the program scheduled to begin at 8 a. m. in the Junior Pavilion. The clinic will be jointly sponsored by Moravia Downs, Inc., a group of New York pony breeders represented by Kilby Kuney of Canoga and the Cooperative Extension Service.

Kuney, a student at Cornell and a recognized trainer and exhibitor of ponies, has arranged a busy schedule of events including lectures on nutrition, disease and parasite control and demonstrations on foot care, grooming, conformation evaluation, training, driving, riding, racing and showing. Appearing on the program will be such well known New York pony enthusiasts as Mr. and Mrs. David Coats, Dr. and Mrs. Charles Hart, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Kuney and Miss Debby Butler.

Cornell will be represented by W. K. Loomis, DVM from the Veterinary College and Professor S. W. Sabin from the Animal Science Department, 4-H Extension.

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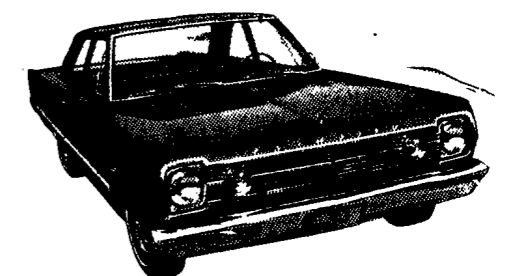
