### CHRISTIAN SCIENCE TOPIC IS "TRUTH"

"Truth" is the subject of the Bible Lesson-Sermon to be considered at all Christian Science services this Sunday. One of the central themes will be Jesus' parable of the sower whose seed fell by the wayside, on stony ground, and among choking thorns — "but other fell into good ground, and brought forth fruit, some a hundredfold, some sixtyfold, some thirtyfold" (Matthew 13).

# Kresge Grant aids Center

The Kresge Foundation recently authorized a grant of \$25,000 toward the funds for building The Church Center now under construction in Syracuse.

In announcing the grant Amos F. Gregory, secretary of the Kresge Foundation, said: "This grant will be conditional upon the balance of the required funds of approximately \$300,000 being raised on, or before, July 1, 1968." "It is the intention of the trustees," continued Gregory, "to allocate an additional sum of \$25,000 in 1967 toward this project if conditions will permit."

The Church Center is being built by the New York State Council of Churches as state or area headquarters for the State Council; the Syracuse Area Council of Churches; the New York Synod of the United Presbyterian Church; the Syracuse Area of the Methodist Church, together with the Upstate New York Conference offices and the State Methodist Student Movement; the New York State Baptist Con-

vention; the Central New York office of the United Church of Christ; and the United Church Women.

The grant will be conditional upon the balance of the required funds of approximately \$300,000 being raised on, or before, July 1, 1968. "It is the intention of the trustees," continued Gregory, "to allocate an additional sum of \$25,000 in 1967 toward this project if conditions will permit."

Dr. Charles H. Schmitz, campaign coordinator for the drive of the New York State Council of Churches, has announced that \$475,000 has been pledged to date. He noted that an average of one pledge a day has been received during the past year. These pledges have come from sources in 38 counties of New York State.

Twenty-five other Foundations have pledged and given to the capital funds drive for The Church Center. A number of churches have pledged, although no program for soliciting the churches has been approved by all concerned. Several churches have had Church Center Sundays.

The Church Center will meet the needs for a central conference center, educational center and laymen's center as well as administrative center. The several denominations planning to occupy The Center are working now from offices with inadequate space. The Church Center will provide them with the space to meet their needs. Further, they will be working from a central location making it easier and simpler to cooperate and communicate with each other and with the Area and State Councils. Such an arrangement will emphasize the present day ecumenical climate.

An increased effort is being made to meet the goal of \$800,000 in order to claim the Kresge conditional grants.

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## Assembly emphasizes the Bible as Guide for all Aspects of Life

Members of the Potsdam Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses were among some twenty thousand persons attending the "God's Sons of Liberty District Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses" in Montreal this weekend.

"The most significant thing about the assembly program," said local presiding minister, Marshall Cummings, "was the emphasis placed on using the Bible as a guide for every aspect of life."

Delegates from 40 States, nine Canadian Provinces and five foreign countries gathered at the Forum, home of the Montreal Canadian hockey club, to take in a five-day program of Bible talks and authentic dramatizations of Biblical events.

"Local Jehovah's Witnesses attending the conference," said Mr. Cummings, "were told of the Christian responsibilities of husbands and fathers in assuming headship of the family. Family Bible study and daily Bible reading were recommended with the father taking the spiritual lead."

It was pointed out that headship of husbands does not mean tyrannical or unreasonable authority but kindness and love in providing for the spiritual needs of the family as well as the material needs, Cummings said.

"It was a family convention," he said, "and it was dominated by the presence of

children and youths accompanying their parents. All sat attentively, taking notes and frequently looking up Bible texts referred to by speakers.

"Bible characters were realistically portrayed in dramatic presentations showing how they resisted temptations to immorality. Youths present were admonished to follow these examples of good conduct rather than follow the crowd in this age of deteriorating morals and waning faith."

One of a panel of ministers spoke on, "What Influences Decisions in Your Life?" "The applying of Bible principles," it was pointed out, "can help us avoid making wrong decisions leading to unhappiness, frustration and wrong pursuits."

In a talk entitled, "Reviving the Spirit of Self-Sacrifice," examples of the lives of early Christians were cited to emphasize the "need for unselfishness and willingness to help others as we live lives of dedication to doing the will of God."

Cummings said, "I am certain that delegates from the local congregation benefited by the entire program. The review of doctrinal and prophetic material as well as instruction on teaching techniques will help each one of us to share the comfort and hope offered in the Scriptures with our neighbors in the community as we call from door to door in the coming months."
