
It is planned that during this two-day program the counselors will have an opportunity to tour the facilities, review on-going programs, as well as, review plans for expansion.

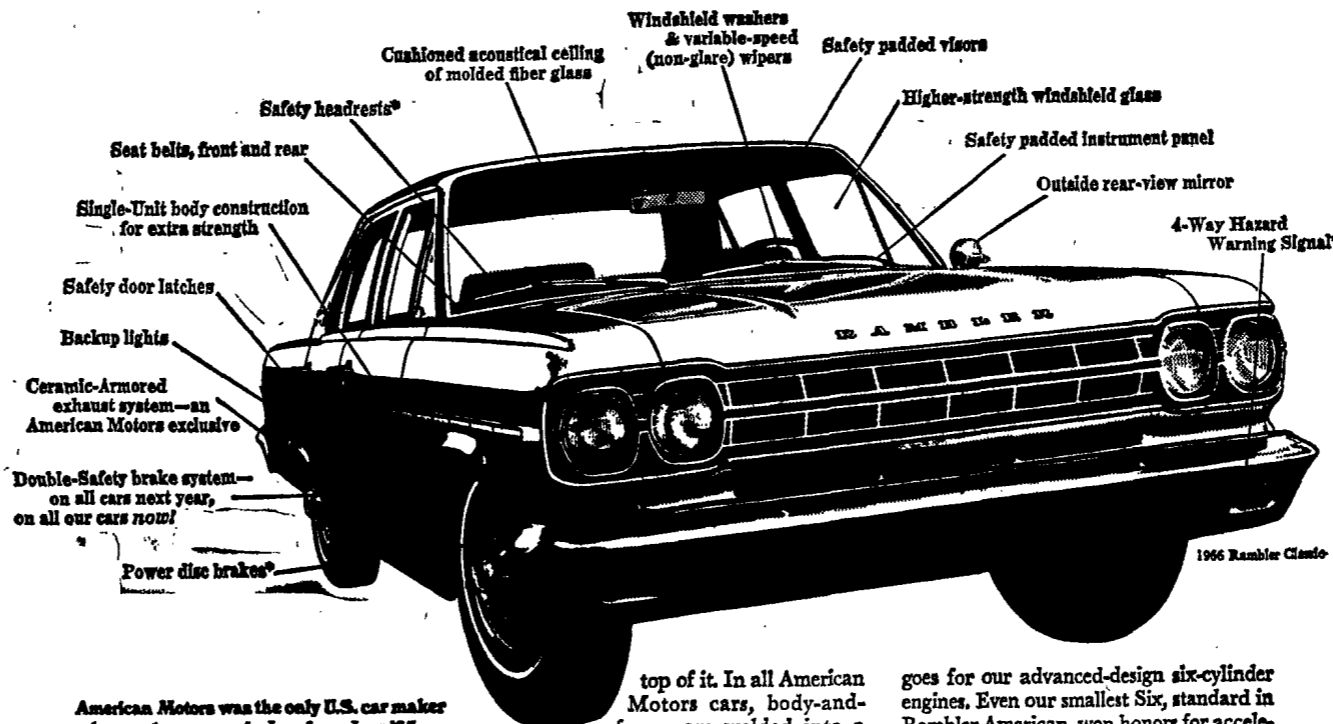
