## Conservation Dept. improves Party-Permit Applications

Major improvements in the processing of an estimated 100,000 party permit applications to take an additional deer during the big game season were announced this week by the State Conservation Department.

## SLU Football begins Sept. 17

St. Lawrence University's football team will open the 1966 gridiron season Saturday, Sept. 17 against the Bates College Bobcats at Weeks Field in Canton. This year's game will be the third renewal of the series that began in 1964, the teams having one victory apiece. Coach Bob Ford will be in his second year as coach at St. Lawrence.

Commissioner R. Stewart Kilborne said that data processing equipment and electronic computers will be used to facilitate handling of the applications and to permit faster and fairer distribution of the permits to deer hunters.

Under the State's party permit system, a group of hunters may take an additional deer-of-either-sex in addition to the one deer legally allowed individual members of the party. In the past, party permit applications have been honored on a first-come, first-served basis.

Commissioner Kilborne said that under the new program, hunters will be able to mail in their applications anytime prior to August 27. Final selection of successful applicants will be handled by computer, thereby giving all hunters an equal chance.

In addition, the new punch-card application form provides hunters an opportunity to select second and third choices for several hunting areas. This option was not possible under the old method.

Another major advantage of the new system is that hunters are not required to send in their big game license and permit fee with their initial application. After the August 27 deadline, all applications will be fed through the computer and successful applicants will be notified that a party permit has been "reserved". At that time, hunters will return the validated permit application to the Department along with a 1966 big game license number for each member of the party and the required fee.

Party permit application forms and detailed instruction sheets, including a description of hunting areas and permit quotas, will be available at license-issuing agents during the first week in August, the Commissioner said.

## Husband-Wife Tourney slated

The Ogdensburg Country Club will sponsor the annual Husband and Wife Golf Tournament on their greens (six miles west of Ogdensburg on Route 37) Sunday, Aug. 28.

Husband and wife play as a team with a couple from another club matched as to handicaps and traveling distance. Starting times are decided by traveling distance with tee-offs beginning at 8 a.m. for couples close to Ogdensburg and staggered times for couples further away. Combined scores of teams constitute gross scores; net score is tallied by subtracting combined handicaps.

Prizes will be given for low gross and low net scores — \$50, \$25, and \$10 gift certificates redeemable at any Spelling's furniture store; any Kinney Drug Store; Algie's Small Smart Shop, Ogdensburg; or Joseph Fisher and Son, Ogdensburg.

## County Fair Harness Races to feature Top N.Y. Drivers

Some of the top drivers in upstate New York — including the winners of the four New York-Vermont Colt Stakes on last year's card — are expected to be on hand for the Gouverneur-St. Lawrence County Fair's three-day, 11-event harness racing meet beginning off a 1:30 p.m. post Wednesday, Aug. 10.

Bob Gale of Bombay, George Burzum of Potsdam, Lee LaPage of Ft. Covington, and Garland Garnsey of Canton will be gunning to repeat as Colt Stakes victors at this year's session.

Gale, who captured the two-year-old pace behind Robert McGreevey's Bedlam Betty, will be in the middle of the 1966 juvenile stakes chase. He has his Superior Song staked in the two-year-old trot, Golden T. Song in the three-year-old trot, and Swing Hi in the two-year-old pace, and is expected to guide Bedlam Betty again as the Poultney, Vt.-owned filly returns in this year's three-year-old pace.

Burzum won the 1965 Gouverneur three-year-old pace with his Seaway Sadios and swept two local early-closers with Seaway Sam and Seaway Selma to tie Gouverneur's Jim Hull for top number of wins. LaPage grabbed the three-year-old trot with Ronald White's Northwood Dusty and shared the fastest trip of the meet with John Moore of Rensselaer Falls as he guided Hearty Dares, a pacer, home in 2:14.

Garnsey, who campaigns regularly at Vernon Downs and brought in 43 winners in 224 trips last year for \$46,000 in purses, won the two-year-old trot with Dr. Franklyn Huber's Speedy Note. He'll be joined at this year's meet by his son, Glen, another Vernon regular.

Challenging the defending stakes winners for driving honors will be the winners

with Burzum of Gouverneur's 1965 local early-closers — Hall and Moore. Hull nailed down two of the four local sakes with his ace trotter Hettie C. and was in the bike as the six-year-old mare turned in the fastest trotting mark of the meet with a 2:16 clocking. Moore guided Herb Wainwright's Tiny Beacon to a stalemate for last year's 2:14 pace mark in winning his early-closer.

Other veteran reinsmen expected to compete at Gouverneur include Bob Hay of Gouverneur, Walker Dyke of Norwich, 70-year-old George McLearn of Hammond, Fred Dishaw of Massena, Kelvin Gale of Bombay, and Charlie Hammond of Boonville, who'll take his 1965 Central New York Harness Horse of the Year, Jack Wax to the gate in the local Gouverneur-St. Lawrence Stake for pacing non-winners of \$8,000 lifetime.

## Honey Kerr Awarded Skating Scholarship

Miss Honey Kerr, current Eastern Senior Ladies Figure Skating Champion, has been awarded a \$600 scholarship prize from the 1961 World Figure Skating Team Memorial Fund.

Eighteen year-old Miss Kerr, a student at St. Lawrence University, won her first Eastern Senior crown in 1965, and successfully defended her title last year at Hershey, Pennsylvania.

Miss Kerr, who regularly logs as much as six hours of skating a day, is coached by Howard Nicholson, famed teacher of former Olympic and world champion Sonja Heine. Honey has also been tutored by Pierre Brunet, coach of another former Olympic and world champion, Carol Heiss.
