A Potsdam native, Miss Fiske is a former junior high home economics teacher at Potsdam Central School and has also been employed as a home service representative for Niagara Mohawk in Jitica and Syracuse and by General

Electric Co. in New York City. An alumna of the State University College at Plattsburgh, she was graduated in 1961 with a B.S. degree in home economics education. She then taught for a year in Potsdam and went on to the Niagara Mohawk positions at Utica and Syracuse. While in Utica, she attended Mohawk Valley Community College and studied advanced interior design.

Prior to joining Niagara Mohawk here, her most recent position has been with G.E.'s Major Appliance and Consumer Electronics Division in New York, where she served both as a demonstration hostess at "Progressland," the G.E. Pavilion at the World's Fair and as a demonstration saleswoman at a distribution showroom in Manhattan.

## GOP Women return Home from Session

Mrs. Marion Hodges, Miss Hattie Boyce, Massena, Mrs. G. Albert Barton, Ogdensburg, Mrs. John Langford, and Mrs. Maurice Young also of Ogdensburg represented St. Lawrence County Republican Women at the Annual convention in Saratoga last week.

Some 325 women from all over the state gathered at the resort area. Lt. Governor Malcolm Wilson offered advice on "How to Retort to Criticism against Major Rockefeller Programs — Medicaid and Taxes."

Medicaid, Wilson said, "is going to do a great many humane things." As for taxes, the Lt. Governor, usually regarded as fiscally conservative, told the group to relate taxes to "State aid — the money that the state collects and sends back to help keep down local real estate taxes."

Commenting the activity of the Women's Clubs, Wilson admitted that women held the balance of power both in legislation and elections.

The conventioners also heard State Senators Warren M. Anderson and Ronald B. Stafford, Assemblywoman Constance E. Cook and Assembly candidate Fred Droms, Jr. in a panel discussion, "How to Ticket a Real Republican."

Hollis S. Ingraham, state health commissioner, addressing the ladies, described Medicaid as "medical emancipation."

Closing sessions included an address by Attorney Louis J. Lefkowitz and Elly M. Peterson, chairman of the Michigan State Republican Committee and assistant chairman of the GOP national committee.

## A FS Student Now in Chile

Santiago, Chile — We arrived at Cerrillos Airport in Santiago on June 30 after a rather spectacular tour of the northern half of Chile from our airliner. Due to unusually clear visibility, we could see the ocean, coastal region, desert, and snow-covered mountains which comprise the northern part of the country. Santiago is about 70 miles inland, situated in a flat valley. The steep, snow-covered mountains in the east form a sharp but picturesque skyline.

Santiago, city of about three million and capital of Chile, is much like an American city in appearance. In the business district, however, on almost every corner there is an office selling tickets to the polka, a type of national lottery. The public transportation in this area are almost always as crowded as American facilities are during a rush hour because of an insufficient number of vehicles. It is common to see about five people hanging from the open door of a bus with their feet on the first step.

The vehicles are of three different types: the trolebus, a large bus powered by electricity from an overhead cable; the micro, a smaller bus similar to an American school bus; and the liebre (meaning "hare"), a small bus about the size of a utility van, which scoots about in the traffic true to its name.

Our district, located in the eastern part of the city, is a typical middle-class residential area. The houses are spaced very closely together but are well constructed and reveal a great deal of individuality, much more than in American homes. All houses, however, are constructed of concrete because of the frequent earthquakes and are bounded by a concrete or steel fence. The small lawns and gardens are carefully maintained by professional gardeners and trees bearing citrus fruit are common. The interiors of the houses are much like ours.

My household, that of Mr. and Mrs. Jose Perez, consists of the five sons of the family and the two servants who also live in the house. Mr. and Mrs. Perez, both licensed pharmacists, run their own pharmacy nearby. Mr. Perez also works as a professor of Toxicology at the University of Santiago.

The school which my brothers and I go to is the San Gabriel's English School, a private school for all grades through high school. The classes are taught in Spanish, but the study of English is emphasized. All of the students speak some English and some of the older students speak fairly well. The students study about twelve subjects a year, carrying these studies throughout their years of high
