

# Calamity Jane named Champion at Regatta

A record crowd was on hand to witness the Northeast Divisional Championships at the running of the eighth annual "Blue Water Regatta," in Waddington, on Sunday, July 24, conducted by the St. Lawrence Valley Boating and Racing Association.

Under ideal conditions, three new champions were named at the event sponsored by the Waddington Volunteer Fire Department. They included Jane Smith, of Ridley Park, Pa., as "A" racing hydro champion, William D. Hoctor, of New Market, N.J., "B" racing hydro champion, and James Coutts, Jr. of North Tonawanda, New York, as the "C" racing champion. Hoctor was injured in the second heat of a later racing class, when his boat flipped, as he was about to go into the far turn. His injuries were not believed to be serious. However, Ray Cummings of Kenmore, operating his 145 inboard hydro, "Wing Ding," was the most seriously injured suffering a multiple fracture of his leg, when he was thrown from his boat. Racing officials said that apparently, Cummings suffered the injury, when his pant leg, became entangled in the craft's propeller shaft, just as he was ejected from the boat. Cummings was taken to Massena Memorial Hospital in the rescue ambulance.

Oscar Martin, of Heuvelton, regional chairman, and member of the American Power Boating Association, and member of the outboard racing commission, and business manager of the St. Lawrence Valley Boating and Racing Association, said today that the "Blue Water Regatta" and the Northeast Divisional Championships, "was one of the most successful regattas conducted this year." Martin, who is a candidate for regional chairman again this year, also pointed out that a large number of the inboards of the 280 class were so severely damaged at the Valleyfield Regatta last week, that it was impossible for the owners and drivers to make them ready for the Regatta at Waddington. Martin's own boat was damaged but he was able to make repairs in time for the races running four heats with his craft.

"The Blue Water Regatta," featured six classes of outboard races, and three classes of inboards. The Summary of winners were as follows: in the "A" Racing Hydro, Jane Smith, driving "Calamity Jane," emerged as A.P.B.A. champion in this class in the "C" service runabout class, Manfred Hagmann of Ottawa, Ont. took both heats and the trophy. In a heavy field of starters for the "B" racing hydro, William D. Hoctor, driving a boat owned by Charles I. Bacheller, of North

Caldwell, N.J., took the Northeast Divisional Championship of this class. The "C" racing hydro championship for the one and two thirds mile course went to James Coutts, Jr., of North Tonawanda. Coutts took the championship of this event with a sizzling time of 3:52.3 for the three laps of the first heat. Again the field was heavy for this class and the competition keen. The class "D" racing hydro fell one short of entry so this class had to be scratched because of insufficient starters. Manfred Hagmann of Ottawa, Ont., scored the only twin victory of the day, when he took the "C" racing run, in addition to his earlier win in the "C" service race.

The action then moved into the inboard class, and the 48 inboards, which saw Leon Richards of Ogdensburg, driving "pit pass," take both heats for a top score of 800 points. Richards is commodore of the St. Lawrence Valley Boating and Racing Association. Oscar Martin, "The Dean of North Country Racing Drivers," pushed his 145 inboard hydro, "Festis" out in front at the start of both heats, took the lead on the inside of the first turn, and turned aside all challengers to emerge victorious in both heats. The final race featured the 280 inboard hydroplanes, and Howie Bennis, of Buffalo, turned in a fine performance in both heats to win this class. An interesting note in conjunction with the hydros concerned Ray Fernandez of Cocksville, Ont. Fernandez left Toronto early Sunday morning with this 145 inboard, "Snafu." He arrived late for the drivers meeting, paid his entry fee, and when "Snafu" was lowered by crane into the water, "Snafu" simply refused to start. In disgust, Fernandez discovered that he was in Waddington for a temper cooling dip in the lovely waters of Lake St. Lawrence!

Dick Mayette, publicity chairman for the "Blue Water Regatta," sponsored by the Waddington Volunteer Fire Department, said today, that members of the department deeply gratified by the record turnout of spectators. Said Mayette, "We were hoping for ideal conditions, with a light four to six inch chop on the lake. We wanted sunny skies and warm temperatures, and on every score, we couldn't have been more successful!"

It was a great show, and the 8 annual running has gone down in the records books of the American Power Boating Association, as one of the best yet!

# Earnings at Nekoosa reach Record Levels

Earnings for Nekoosa-Edwards Paper Company reached record first-half levels, climbing 30 per cent over the first six months of 1965 on a 12 per cent increase in sales.

Earnings for the six months ended June 30 were \$3,315,925, or \$1.41 per share, compared with \$2,545,920 and \$1.09 per share for the same period last year. Earnings for the second quarter alone were \$1,634,541 or 69c. Last year they were \$1,217,415 and 52c.

Sales for the first six months were \$58,953,864, up from \$52,517,596 last year. Sales for the quarter ended June 30 were \$29,775,349. Last year they were \$26,133,528.

Sam Casey, president of the Port Edwards, Wis. firm, reported that demand for Nekoosa's business communication papers is at record levels, an opportune situation coincident with the new production facilities now coming on stream. He said, "We expect to continue at high sales and profit levels for the rest of the year."
