African Independence Topic of SUCP Conference

More than 100 New York State social studies teachers are expected to arrive at The State University College at Potsdam Monday, Aug. 8 for the start of a three-day conference on Africa — Problems of Independence.

The program is the ninth annual social studies conference to be held on the Potsdam campus under the sponsorship of the New York State Council for the Social Studies, the State Education Department and the college.

Dr. Victor E. Minotti, professor of geography at Potsdam and conference chairman, has released a program schedule listing several authorities on African affairs as speakers.

Following registration and a reception Monday afternoon, the formal program will get underway with a dinner meeting featuring Rev. R. Frederick (Rufus) Green, rector of the Church of the Redeemer, Watertown, as speaker. Rev. Green spent three decades in Southern Rhodesia, where he developed knowledge in many aspects of African life.

Chairman of the Monday night session will be Jacob I. Hotchkiss of the State Education Department's bureau of social studies education.

Tuesday morning and afternoon sessions will feature discussions of methods and resource materials available for teaching the study of Africa.

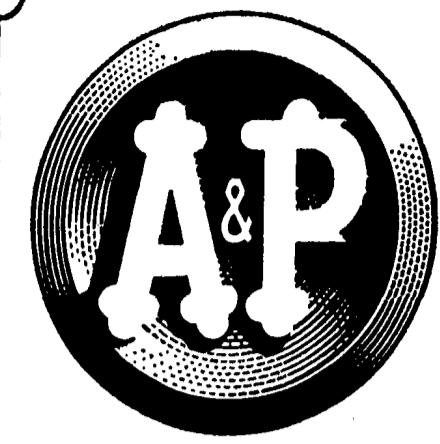

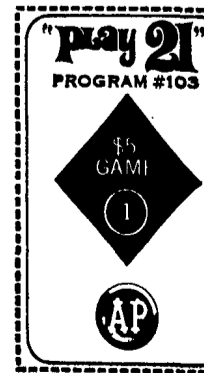

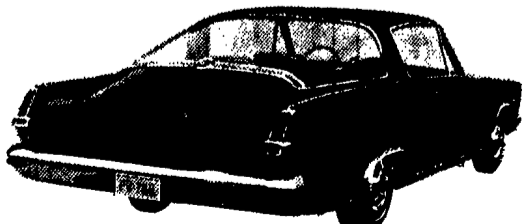
