

### Attorney General concerned with Foundations, Election Inspectors

Charitable foundations, election inspectors, the constitutional convention and gyp artists were all items of concern for Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz this past week.

A measure recommended by the Attorney General and passed by the 1966 Legislature gives the State Department of Law new supervisory and investigative powers over charitable foundations, organizations and trusts. He said such organizations will be required to file reports with the Department of Law of the nature of their assets and how such funds are administered.

It was announced this week that the Attorney General has forwarded a letter to James M. Power, Chairman of the Board of Elections, urging that individuals serving as election inspectors be given complete and detailed instructions in the performance of their duties. He added that

this was done in order that there be no recurrence of irregularities which have marked recent primaries and general elections.

### Professor ends Criminal Study

A psychology professor at The State University College at Potsdam has completed a study probing the psychological factors that lead an individual to commit a crime against society.

Dr. A. Steven Giannelli has published the results of his study in an article entitled, "Psychological Needs Characteristic of Four Criminal Offender Groups," appearing in the 1966 edition of the Journal of Social Psychology.

The study was conducted under a grant awarded Dr. Giannelli by the State University Research Foundation, for the purpose of determining psychological needs of adult and juvenile male and female offenders.

As a basis for his study, Dr. Giannelli tested groups of inmates at four Ohio correctional institutions. Through the result of this testing and the theories derived from his analysis, the Potsdam educator hopes to form an "index of criminality," consisting of psychological measuring devices that permit a prediction to be made about an individual's crime potential.

### Insurance Co. Aids Colleges

Area colleges and universities have received \$355 from Connecticut General Life Insurance Company as part of \$85,206 being distributed this year to 171 privately supported colleges and universities under the company's annual Program of Aid to Higher Education.

Recipients are Clarkson College of Technology and St. Lawrence University.

Through this program Connecticut General distributes funds, unrestricted as to use, to private colleges and universities in the form of selected grants and gifts which match employee contributions.

Connecticut General has given colleges and universities throughout the country a total of \$444,105 in unrestricted financial aid since the program was started in 1959.

## AFL - CIO & United Fund Chairmen begin Campaign

Representatives of the United Funds of Watertown and St. Lawrence County, together with labor leaders representing the Watertown Building & Construction Trades Council AFL/CIO "Kicked-Off" a summer campaign to solicit AFL/CIO Construction Union membership in support of the annual United Fund drives in the up-state area last week.

The briefing session, held at Canal's Hotel in Gouverneur, was conducted by Richard Hollenbeck, Watertown Campaign Chairman; Col. Joseph Landauer, Director of the Watertown United Fund; and David R. Garner, Director of the St. Lawrence County United Fund.

The solicitation is being accomplished by labor union business agents, with the endorsement of the Northern New York Builders Exchange, representing a majority of the contractors working in the four-county area of Franklin, Jefferson, St. Lawrence and Lewis Counties. It was pointed out by Sam Agati, a member of the Board of Directors of the St. Lawrence County United Fund and President of the Construction Trades Council, that all contributions will be credited to the home area of each contributor.

According to United Fund sources, this "pre-campaign" solicitation is being watched with interest by other United

Funds from all parts of the nation. It is the first four-county area campaign ever attempted to reach Construction Union personnel.

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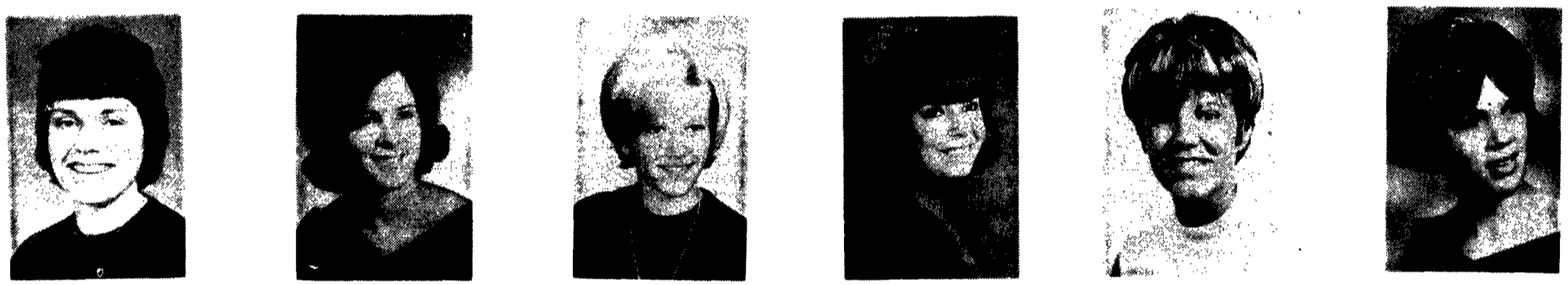
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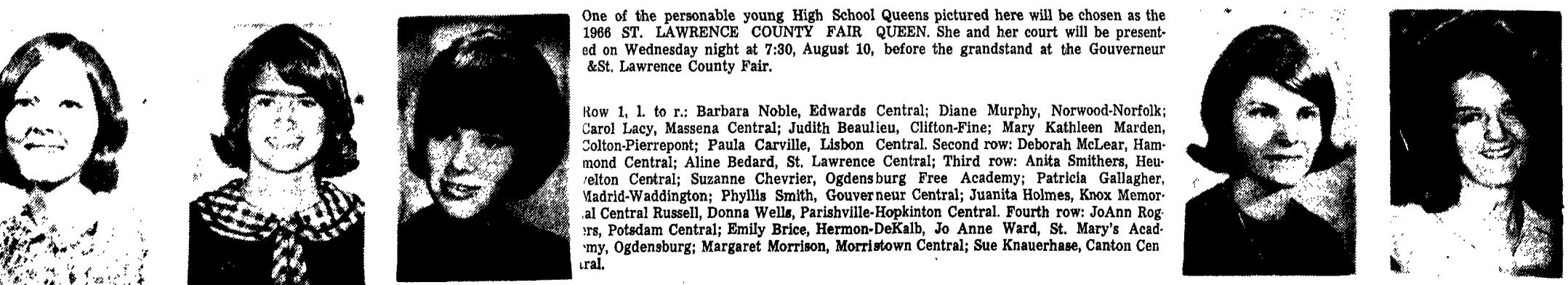
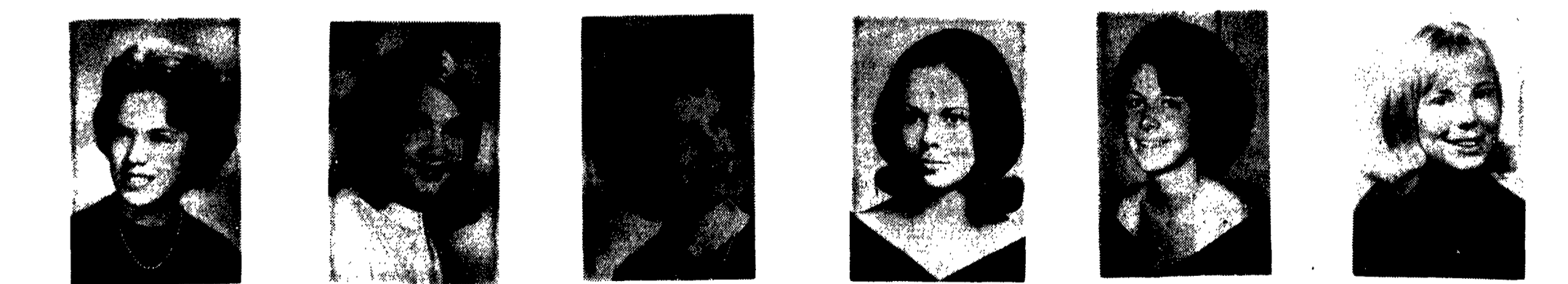
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# WHO will wear the Crown?
