McElheran cites Variety of Musical Activity in U.S.

The days of marked differences in musical tastes among followers of classical and popular music are fast fading from the American scene, according to a respected choral conductor.

Brock McElheran, professor of music at the State University College at Potsdam, in an article tracing the development of music education in the United States appearing in the summer issue of the Canadian journal, "The Amateur Musician," notes a flurry of musical activity in the United States today.

He cites the more than 1,300 symphony orchestras; the fact that nearly every high school has a band and chorus and many have orchestras; and the increase of choral performances in both number and quality as examples of classical activity.

The director of Potsdam's Crane Collegiate Singers, a selected mixed chorus, also lists the 18 million total of classical record sales as recently as 1964, the 37 million amateur musicians and the hundreds of music festivals held in the United States each year as additional evidence of classical development.
