Farmers share Agway Refund

Area farmers will be among Agway members in 12 states who will share in a \$2,700,000 cash patronage refund announced last week.

The one percent return on purchases will apply to Agway commodities bought by members during the fiscal year which ended June 30, according to Burton McElwain, Mgr. Potsdam Agway Inc.

Announcement of the action of the Agway board of directors in declaring the refund was made at Agway headquarters in Syracuse, N. Y., by Edmund H. Fallon, executive vice president and general manager of the cooperative.

The refund brings to more than \$7,000,000 the amount returned to members in the form of refunds, stock dividends and interest on other Agway securities, he said.

Fallon noted that the refund was the second paid since information of Agway by the merger of Cooperative GLF Exchange and Eastern States Farmers' Exchange in 1964, and the subsequent merger of Pennsylvania Farm Bureau with Agway.

The 1965-66 refund will be distributed to members late this fall, Fallon said.

Although anyone may buy from Agway through its system of stores and dealers, only farmers can be members and only members are eligible for patronage refunds.

Fallon said Agway membership had risen by some 10,000 farmers in the last year, and now stands at 85,000 in New England, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland and Ohio.
