### AFS Student attends Camp

I'm back in my hometown, Vaasa, again after spending a week at a local Finnish Girl Scout Camp and what a week it was.

Because my sister was classified as a leader, I too received the same classification.

The camp was about 20 miles from Vaasa, located on the sea, and very similar to the pine and birch forests of Canada.

During the first few days, everything was so strange that I didn't think I'd ever get used to it. Unless you've experienced the strange feeling of not being able to talk to others or to understand them, you might not realize what it means. Everyone around me was speaking Finnish, and since my vocabulary is still rather limited, I hardly understood a thing. Two of the other leaders, Solveig and Petteeri, were a wonderful help to me, speaking to me often and translating what they could. I really don't know what I would have done without these two wonderful people.

Our schedule was well regulated starting each morning at 8 a.m. with breakfast, flag raising, and a morning prayer. Since 93% of Finland is Lutheran, many of the activities were church oriented, both the morning prayer and an evening Bible reading period as well as religious programs twice weekly. Classes, tent inspections, swimming, campfires, were much like American scouting activities as were the unplanned songfests I enjoyed with the leaders.

One of the evening programs was a "Roskisdyykari", entertainment planned and acted out by the girls themselves. There were several very old and silly acts, seen many times and supposedly corny, but I enjoyed them all!

On the last night out, we had a pancake cook and songfest. Petteeri got up and asked me to please stand up and come over to her. Rather suspicious, I got up and she presented me with a Finnish ABC Book with the leaders' signatures as a reminder of the week I had spent at the camp. All I could say was thank you but I really felt so much at that moment: I had found some truly good friends.

I can only say that my week at the camp was a happy and memorable experience during which I got to know girls my own age despite our communications difficulties. It was such a victory on both sides when we understood each other, and I found that often what we talked about was just about the same things American girls talk about. I learned that the only difference lay in our languages and individual characteristics.

One other evening Petteeri decided that it was time to put to use the skills the girls had supposedly learned in class. She awoke the campers at 1:30 a.m. and told them that a little boy was lost in the woods. We formed a chain and walked through the woods looking for the youngster who supposedly had a broken leg which meant that we'd have to fashion a stretcher and carry him back to camp. We started on time and everything was very official until, with Petteeri as chief leader, we got ourselves lost. By the time we reached the little boy, who was, by the way, Solveig, it was 3:30 a.m. We didn't make the stretcher and Solveig had to walk back to camp.

In the woods we found and ate some "cloud berries," very rare and usually found near marshes. Yellow in color, they are similar in shape and size to our blackberries, but they have a unique taste and are really quite good.

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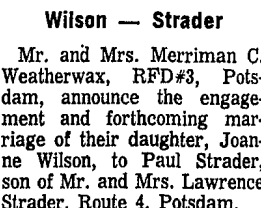
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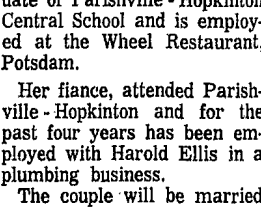
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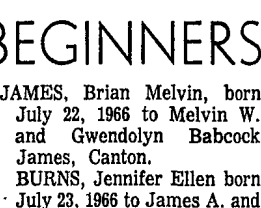

The Kilroys will make their home at 247 Carlton Club Drive, Piscataway, N. J.



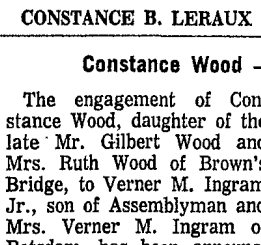

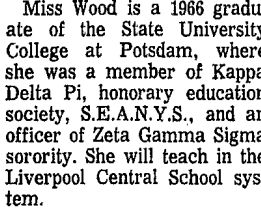

The bride, a native of Norfolk, attended Norwood-Norfolk Central School.

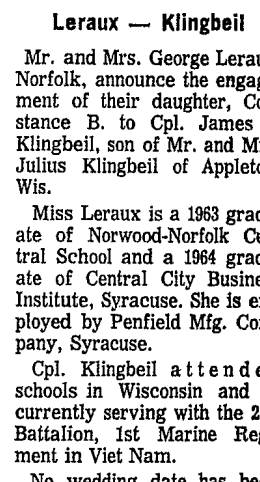
The groom graduated from Ausable Forks High School and has served six years in the U. S. Marines. He is now employed at the Marlem Valley Hospital, Wingdale.

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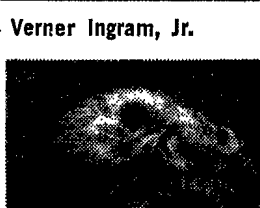
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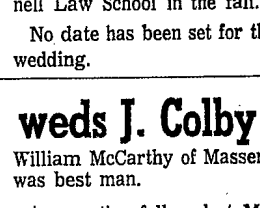
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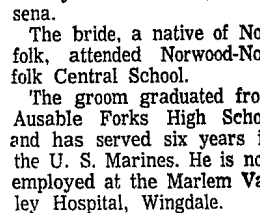
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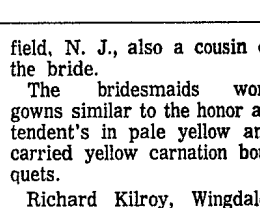
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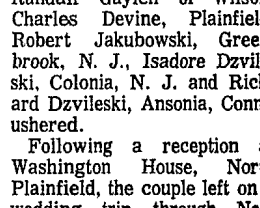
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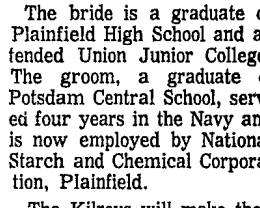
