

### Extension Service sets 2-Day County Dairy Tour

Modern methods of cow housing, milking and materials handling will be emphasized during a two-day dairy tour sponsored by the St. Lawrence County Cooperative Extension.

Travel on the tour, Aug. 29 and 30, will be by bus only, in order to avoid traffic problems and also to allow discussion of what is seen. In addition, Extension Staff members will present supplementary information while in transit.

According to reliable reports, St. Lawrence County is presently undergoing changes in cow housing and material storage and handling at a more rapid rate than any other area in New York State.

The tour, therefore is expected to provide valuable information to dairy farmers and agri-business people. Any other interested persons are also invited to sign up on a first come, first served basis.

Reservations should be mailed to the County Extension Service at Box 69, Canton, N. Y. 13617.

Nineteen stops are planned for the two days. The buses will leave on the first day, Aug. 29, from Herman-DeKalb Central School at 9 a.m. sharp and will return at 5 p.m.

Their eight stops will include: cold free stall barns, herringbone parlors, side opening parlor, double side opening parlor, around the barn pipeline, cattle guards and precast bunks, around the silo auto feeder, circular bunk feeder, double in line walk through parlor, stanchion barn and parlor.

The second day's tour will leave from the Courthouse parking lot at Canton, Aug. 30 at 9 a.m., returning at 5 p.m. and including 11 stops: warm free stall barn, calves raised in cold barn, agronomy research plots, liquid manure handling, outside bunk with auger feeder, warm and cold free stalls used in combination, sealed storages, drive thru feeding in stanchion barn, double 6 herringbone, double 2 side opener, low line and high line milking, conventional barns remodeled as feeding areas.

Picnic lunches should be brought by participants and milk will be available for purchase.

### 2 County Men win Awards

Michael C. McClosky and Mark J. Patterson are among the 202 recipients of Regents War Service Scholarships for Veterans, Commissioner of Education Dr. James E. Allen announced recently.

The only two applicants in St. Lawrence County, receiving the recently inaugurated award, McClosky and Patterson are entitled to payment of up to \$350 a year for the period of four years for full or part time study, graduate or undergraduate day or evening in any college, university, business, professional vocational, technical or trade school located in New York State and licensed or approved by the Board of Regents.

The new program, established by the 1966 legislature, is effective for use beginning in the 1966-67 school year.

Rev. E. Bragg, 75 Rites conducted Norfolk — Funeral services were held from the Remsen Methodist Church, Wednesday, July 27 for the Rev. Ernest Bragg, 75, formerly pastor of the West Stockholm Church. Rev. Bragg died Saturday, July 23 at Theresa.

Burial was made in Prospect Cemetery, Remsen.

Rev. Bragg was born Oct. 11, 1890 in Norfolk. He was a son of the Rev. John Bragg and Emma Daggett Bragg. Entering the ministry Oct. 14, 1915 he was first stationed at Buck's Bridge and later at the West Stockholm Methodist Church. In 1920, he assumed duties at Plessis where he served 11 years in the same pastorate held by his father, the Rev. John Bragg, from 1902 until 1919.

He was the Grand Chaplain of the New York State I.O.O.F., installed in this office on Sept. 15, 1928. Transferred from Plessis, Rev. Bragg served in Madison from 1930 to 1936 followed by a pastorate in Oriskany Falls. Rev. Bragg married Leah Mae Perry in Norfolk on Christmas day, 1911. She died in 1952. In 1953 he married Laura Hunter Jordan. Before his retirement in 1956 after 40 years service, Rev. Bragg also was stationed in Remsen and Lake Worth, Fla.
