

Washington Report

It would have seemed fantastic, only a short time ago, if we had been told that the summer of 1967 would see tanks and helicopters patrolling our streets, armed battalions enforcing the peace of our cities, and thousands of our fellow citizens looted on an aimless orgy of violence, robbery and death.

A violent few cannot be permitted to threaten the lives and well-being of the many, nor lawless gangs to disrupt the peace of our cities and the hopes of their fellows for progress. Those who lead others to burn and kill must feel the full force of the law. That, however, is just the beginning. Punishment is not prevention. The riots may have passed their peak-let us hope so-but now we enter a period of equal danger. It is the danger of a deepening division between white and black America. It is the danger that fear will breed resentment, and resentment will bring hostility, and increasing hostility feed mounting fear.

If we try to look through the eyes of the young slum-dweller-the Negro, the Puerto Rican, and the Mexican-American-the world is a dark and hopeless place indeed. It must be a cruel and humbling fact-but it is a fact nonetheless-that our efforts have not even maintained the problem as it was-economic and social conditions in these areas, says the Department of Labor, are growing worse, not better.

In this light, our responsibility is clear. We must reject the counsel of those who are willing only to pass laws against violence, while refusing to help eliminate rats, of those who ignore the disproportion of spending billions for the freedom of others while denying our own people. We must offer that leadership-in every legislature and school board and city hall-which dares to speak out before it tests the shifting wind of popular anger and confusion.

And Some Positive Steps Toward Solutions

On July 12, I introduced the Urban Employment Opportunities Development Act to encourage private investment in urban poverty areas. The specific purpose of the bill is to stimulate investment-the

creation of new jobs and incomes-in poverty areas. The entire program is to be carried out, not by government agencies, but by private enterprise. The Federal Government would provide only a system of tax incentives carefully designed to enable private enterprise to make its investments and carry out its operations in the urban poverty areas.

Thus the bill seeks to remedy the greatest inadequacy in our existing poverty efforts: the failure to involve and rely on the private enterprise system which is the basic strength of the nation. By failing to involve the private sector, we have ignored the potential contributions of millions of talented and energetic Americans in tens of thousands of productive enterprises.

On July 13, I introduced a companion bill, the Urban Housing Development Act, to induce private enterprise to engage in the physical reconstruction and rehabilitation of housing in urban poverty areas. The bill would create a mechanism by which private enterprise can and will build and rehabilitate large numbers of low-cost housing units in urban poverty areas. First, it attempts to lower costs by providing an extended interest rate subsidy. Second, it aims to attract large-scale private enterprise investment through a system of tax incentives. Through these techniques, the bill attempts a substantial reduction in the standard housing that mars our cities.

The Elections in Vietnam

Developments surrounding the elections in Vietnam have become a matter of grave concern, not only in both Houses of Congress, but throughout America.

Our purpose in Vietnam is not simply to win a war. It is not just to contain China, or to halt revolutions in other lands. It is, most fundamentally, and honorably, to protect and insure the right of the South Vietnamese people to govern themselves; to determine the nature of their society; and to select their leaders free from external control and internal violence.

Yet there is mounting and distressing evidence of efforts to interfere with the free choice of the people. Candidates were barred because their views were "unacceptable," though they were loyal citizens. Jails still contain prisoners whose only offense is opposition to the present government. The right of candidates to debate issues was restricted by press censorship. And there are reports that the military government, through the formation of a "military affairs council," is moving to perpetuate its power regardless of the voting. Under the circumstances, with candidates stifled or silenced in advance, there will have been no election. And the Vietnamese people will be denied the chance to chart their own future. The United States should not even appear to be a party to such a denial.

In the face of these developments, we must reassert the basic premise of our commitment-that we are there to help, but that the Vietnamese must take the lead both in resisting the enemy forces, and in promoting an open society. If the energy that has characterized the military resistance to Communism can be joined to shape an energetic political alternative to it, then we shall have fulfilled, rather than helped to undermine, the moral basis of our presence in Vietnam.

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to Section 436 of the Conservation Law, the Water Resources Commission will cause public hearings to be held as follows:

(1) Assembly Room, County Court House, Malone, New York on September 28, 1967 at 9:30 A.M.

(2) Board of Supervisors Chambers, County Court House, Canton, New York on September 28, 1967 at 2:30 P.M.

These proceedings are necessary for the purpose of hearing all persons, public corporations, and New York State agencies that may be significantly affected by the proposal of the Counties of ST. LAWRENCE AND FRANKLIN to institute, with assistance by the State, the preparation of a comprehensive multi-purpose plan for the protection, control, conservation, development and beneficial utilization of the water resources of the above named counties lying within the St. Lawrence River Basin. Papers pertaining to this proposal have been filed with the Water Resources Commission at its office in Albany, New York where the same are open for public inspection. The information obtained at these hearings will be used by the Commission in determining whether it is or is not in the public interest to undertake the survey and study as proposed. All persons, private corporations, municipal corporations, or other civil divisions of the State of New York, who wish to appear at these hearings in favor of or in opposition to the said proposal, in order to be heard thereon, shall file a notice of appearance in writing and in duplicate in the office of the Water Resources Commission in the city of Albany, New York on or before the 27 day of September, 1967.

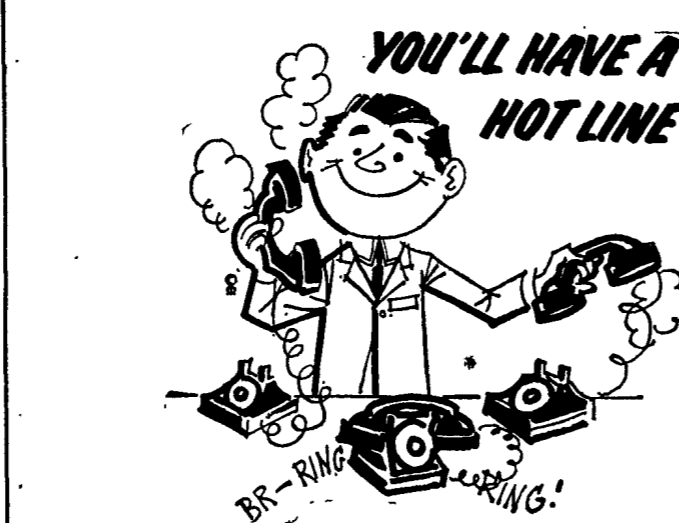
