

Enrollment, Drainage, Buildings Topic at School Board Meeting

A lengthy session of the Norwood-Norfolk Board of Education dealt with a variety of business ranging from drainage problems to a report on the Board of Cooperative Educational Services proposed building program.

A total of 1881 pupils are currently enrolled in the local public schools, Richard W. Hann, Supervising Principal, told the Board. Of this number, 820 are at the Junior-Senior High School where the faculty consists of nine language, four science, two commerce, two music, four mathematics, seven social studies, three physical education, two industrial arts teachers, a guidance counselor, a vocation and art teacher.

The 461 pupils at the Norwood Elementary School, are instructed by 17 teachers while 20 teachers at the Norfolk Elementary School have a total of 542 pupils. The Raymondville Elementary School children. The three elementary schools are under the direction of a grade supervisor and share the services of the music, art, girls' physical education teachers and elementary librarian.

The school psychologist two nurses a dental hygienist and a speech therapist complete the professional staff headed by Hann and Vice Principal F.W. Kelly.

The persistent problem of improper water drainage in the space under the new library was discussed following the report of the committee on buildings and grounds, John Margittay and Kenyon Jones, that water was on the floor each time they inspected the area. They are to meet with John Deirlein of the firm of Sargent, Webster, Crenshaw and Foley, architects, in charge of the construction of the addition.

A letter from J. P. Hawley, manager of the Norwood office of the St. Lawrence County National Bank asking for a portion of the District's banking business was read.

A letter from Norwood attorney Lee H. Turner suggesting that the difficulty in getting ice time for the NNCS' ice cream practice could be partially alleviated by making a hockey rink from a portion of the sport field at the rear of the school and using rink boards stored in Norfolk, was also read.

A letter from H.H. and F.E. Bean, Inc., of New York, contractors for the building construction was read. They asked that the 10 percent fee retained by the district until the performance of their contract is completed be put into specified bonds through a New York City bank in accordance with General Municipal Law 106. The firm has to date completed about 50 percent of the work specified under their \$100,000 contract. The Board will get an immediate ruling on this matter from the New York State Education legal department.

In other action Board President Dr. Donald Bixby asked the faculty committee, Shirley Oroglio, Willard Beyer, Hann and Kelly, to meet with Teachers' Association representatives this month. Cafeteria committee member, Mrs. Caroline Colbert, accompanied by Business Manager Douglas Ridley, will visit each cafeteria.

The Norfolk Girl Scouts were granted permission to use the cafeteria of the Norfolk Elementary school each Monday evening as they did last year. Ridley reported that an overtime scale for the bus drivers and others who work more than the allotted 44 hours per week was prepared and payment would be made at the rate of \$3 or more per hour of overtime. Army Paper in Vietnam Cites Pierce, Norwood

Vietnam is half a world away from Norwood, but is aware of what this little community has done to help the orphans there.

Norwood serviceman Pfc. Chester R. Pierce, a photographer assigned to the 18th Military Police Brigade, made an effort to obtain teaching materials for the 350 Vietnamese orphans residing in the Tu Duc Orphanage Nationale. His efforts and the response from Norwood residents have been the subject of an article in "The Army Reporter," an authorized U.S. Army publication in Vietnam.

The news item tells of the drive for color books and crayons which grew as a result of a letter from Pierce to Rev. Frank I. Smith, pastor of First Methodist Church, Norwood. Pierce in the letter told of his work as one of a five-man friendship team working weekly with the orphans and of the need for

materials to use in teaching them English and about the better way of life which could be theirs in the years ahead.

A local crusade was started in Norwood following the arrival of the letter. Excerpts from the letter and a photograph of a few of the orphan children were printed in "The Courier and Freeman" accompanied by a statement from a local merchant who offered to collect contributions (Ed. note: Morgan's TV Shop).

The drive for these items will end Sept. 2 when friends of Pierce will gather at the Methodist Church at 9:30 p.m. to pack the gifts for mailing. It is hoped that additional gifts will be received before then.
