Farmers Getting 11.25 Cents Quart

Dairy farmers will receive a uniform farm price of \$5.43 per hundredweight of 11 1/4 cents per quart for August milk deliveries to pool handlers in the New York-New Jersey milkshed, Dr. A. J. Pollard, market administrator, announced this week.

The July price was \$4.99 or 10 cents; \$5.10 or 11 cents was paid in August, 1966.

The producer butterfat differential will be computed at 6.2 cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above the 3.5 percent of fluid milk (Class 1) to \$3,275,862, or 7.6 percent, to \$30,860,056 pounds.

The declines were due in part to the loss of several milk plants to the Delaware Valley marketing order, some of which sell milk in the New York-New Jersey marketing area, Dr. Pollard explained. In addition, about 10,400,000 pounds of the decrease in Class I sales resulted from milk standardizing.

Class I sales made up 53.7 percent of the pool, compared to 56.3 percent in August, 1966. Handlers paid \$5.97 per hundredweight for milk received in the 201-210 mile zone and used as fluid.

Receipts at bulk tank units rose 41,939,667 pounds to 452,759,364 pounds, Dr. Pollard said. The percentage of the pool, however, declined by 3.321 to 32.627, Dr. Pollard said. Average deliveries per day per producer rose 50 pounds to 794 pounds.

Dairy farmers earned \$43,658,024.45 at order prices for August milk deliveries. The administrator explained that this figure does not include all the differentials paid to dairy farmers.

The uniform farm price of \$5.43 per hundredweight will be paid for milk testing 3.5 percent butterfat and received within 201-210 miles of New York City.

These buildings are inadequate in size and layout as well as expensive to utilize," according to William E. Hart, principal. Four of the buildings are located mid-point between Norwood and Potsdam on Route 56, another across from the Sunset Lodge on Route 56 and the sixth at the Potsdam Central School.

The new building site is located on the west side of Route 56 between Potsdam and Norwood, approximately a quarter mile from the Norwood village limits.

Hart said this parcel of land includes 54 acres; 20 of which are useable for construction, and the remaining used for conservation as well as other school projects.

The proposed building will be modular block, one-story structure, containing about 46,000 square feet. The design will be simple in overall appearance with brick and pre-finished steel wall panels as the principle exterior material.

The L shape of the building is dictated by the specific needs in terms of the types of courses being taught and the element of flexibility. Unlike most school buildings, there will be no auditorium, gymnasium or athletic fields.

The building is designed to meet the projected curriculum needs and enrollment increase for the next five years. The center will accommodate approximately 680 high school youth during normal school hours and approximately 300 adults in the evening.

Presently, the rented quarters serve about 350 students from the participating schools and 200 in adult education classes.

Under the new plan, the new center would continue to be operated by the Board of Cooperative Educational Services.

He refers citizens of the county to a recent geographical study of the state which projects a mere one percent population growth for St. Lawrence County during the next 12 years. Only a 4 percent rate of increase is seen for the county by the year 2000, according to Geography of New York State (Syracuse University Press, 1966).

By striking contrast, the study shows that Onondaga County (Syracuse) will grow by 87 percent by 1980, and 255 percent by 2000. Dutchess County on the Hudson River will leap in population by 133 percent and 423 percent in the comparable periods.

The geographers visualize that 19 million of the state's 21.2 million people in 1980 will be living in the seven great urban systems - Albany-Schenectady, Binghamton, Buffalo, New York, Rochester, Syracuse and Utica.

"The causes of slow growth are many but generally they are related to the lack of potential for urbanization," says Romola. "If nearly 80 percent of all new jobs are to be in and around the urban systems, it is obvious that strictly agricultural counties cannot expect to grow."

Surplus population -- often including the most able people tend to migrate to faster growing areas where jobs are more plentiful and varied, he notes.

"St. Lawrence County is so much blank white paper on the maps of the future... authorities simply write off our area as insignificant in future economic progress," according to Romola.

But the St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce is determined that the predictions of the geographers and economists will not be accurate, said the Potsdam bank executive.

The chamber intends to acquaint county college students with job opportunities in the area. It will also work with local colleges in encouraging research-oriented industries to locate in the county.

Existing industries will be urged to encourage the establishment of satellite industries nearby, and Canadian industries will be told of the

Potsdam as elsewhere in the county have been taxed just about to the limit of their endurance and ability to pay, if I am any judge. What is to happen if we tax them right out of existence? Where then will the money be found to finance the modern day expenses of running a progressive and effective governmental operation?"

The candidate went on to express his hope and confidence that the St. Lawrence County Board of Supervisors and its Finance Committee will continue to study carefully all departmental requests with an eye toward cutting wherever vital and necessary services would not be adversely affected.

"Preparing such a budget is a tedious and frustrating task," asserted Murphy, a former member of the Potsdam Village Board, a post he resigned when he cast his hat in the ring for the town's top elective position.

Regarding the allocations for the welfare department which have been under special fire from the citizenry, Murphy reminded that it would be practically impossible for him or any other ordinary taxpayer to accurately or fairly assess the validity of the expenditures proposed for this department. "Only a few authorized persons have access to full information on the workings and record of this department," he noted, adding however that the cost of administration seems high.

"I take heart, however," stated the candidate, "from published reports that Don Livingston, the chairman of the Board's Welfare Committee, appears to favor cutting budget requests in some areas in an attempt to hold down costs.

"It's undeniably a matter of grave concern to Potsdam taxpayers, since Potsdam is one of the largest communities and one of the wealthier ones in the county; hence, it would in the natural course of events be faced with an appropriate assessment for additional revenue.

"On the plus side of the ledger," concluded the candidate, "Potsdam's supervisor holds 40 votes on the county board, the second highest number of any one representative in the county. Massena only has 14, with 61. Ogdensburg's total is 49, but this is distributed among four supervisors, one from each of the four wards, Potsdam, Massena and Ogdensburg, with a few of the smaller townships, could probably carry any vote at the moment."

"Potsdam has a difficult problem in the matter of registering its citizens to vote; in that several of the district lines have been redrawn with the end result that many citizens have been changed to a different polling place and election district. I earnestly recommend that everybody in Potsdam seek information either from your local clerk, or from the town clerk, and attend to the matter of voter registration, if you have not already done so," Murphy urged.

Murphy added that reports reach him that many citizens are not yet aware of the full implications of Permanent Personal Registration. The fact that one has always been registered is no longer enough, he pointed out. Every single voter must register himself, personally. There are four registration dates left in which to protect this precious privilege, so that the responsibilities of citizenship may be exercised at the polls, he noted. The dates are October 3, 7, 13 and 14 at your polling place.

A graduate of local schools, Murphy served for three years in the U.S. Marine Corps in World War II, with most of his service occurring in the Far East. Upon his return, he went into business at the Shell Station on Elm St. with his father, the late Elmer J. Murphy, a former Mayor of Potsdam Village and for 18 years a supervisor of the town. mayor said he favors this plan because it would be the fastest way to build housing and at the same time the village would not have to become directly involved.

Under other programs, the mayor pointed out it would mean "three to five years" waiting for federal approval of construction funds. Using a private developer, the village can cut all this federal "red tape," the mayor stated.

The board seemed to agree with the mayor's approach to public housing.

Trustee Taylor told the board that Robert J. Haldeman of 121 Leroy St. has complained he has been assessed for curbing along his house on Bradley Dr. Taylor stated when Haldeman purchased his lot there were no plans for Bradley Dr. and, therefore, is it fair to make him pay for the curbing? Board members were sympathetic to Haldeman's predicament, and said they would investigate how the charge could be done away with.

In other action, the board:

1. Allotted eight additional parking spaces on Park St. for firemen's use only. It was pointed out by George Sullivan, fire chief, that firemen reporting to the station for emergencies had no place to park their cars.

2. Discussed at length the one-way traffic system. Village Administrator James J. Mulcare said he expects to meet with State Department of Public Works officials on Tuesday to make refinements in the system. Any changes, Mulcare said, will be announced. It was also discussed that the intersection of Maple St. and Clarkson Ave. was not marked properly for left hand turns on to Clarkson Ave. for traffic leaving the village. The mayor suggested that an "advance on green signal for left turns" system be installed.

3. Was told by Mulcare that the village faced paying school and town taxes on the property purchased from Delta Kappa Sigma for a municipal parking lot until next year. He would wish school and town officials to see if the taxes could be waived.

4. Okayed payment of \$150 to Attorney Verner M. Ingram who represented the village employee involved in a traffic accident with a vehicle driven by Mrs. Robert Rowe. The charge against the village employee was dismissed. Mrs. Rowe's civil claim for \$70,000 is still pending in another court.

5. Appointed James Lewis as a patrolman of the Police Department on a permanent basis, since he recently passed the State of New York, who wish to appear at these hearings in favor of or in opposition to the said proposal, in order to be heard thereon, shall file a notice of appearance in writing and in duplicate in the office of the Water Resources Commission in the city of Albany, New York on or before the 27 Day of September, 1967.
