## Savings Banks' Deposits Grow

New York State savings banks last month had a net inflow of regular deposits of \$132 million which was almost double the 1966 August figure, the Savings Banks Association of New York State announced this week. This August's gain in deposits was 0.39 percent over the July 31 balance for 1967.

The savings banks of New York State now hold \$34.4 billion in deposits, according to Dr. Austin S. Murphy, the Association's managing director. He also stated that of this amount, \$34.3 billion is held in regular accounts which now number just slightly less than 9.5 million out of a total of 11.1 million accounts.

The deposit increase for this August represents a continuation of the trend of record or near-record deposit increases for the past eight months. Record increases in deposits have been accompanied by significant increases in the number of regular accounts as well. As a case in point, the increase in regular accounts for 15 months ending this August 31 was more than six times the increase for the similar period ending August 31, 1965.

## Employment at Unusual Figure

Albany—Total employment in New York State soared to 7,880,000 in July—the second highest level in the State's history—State Commerce Commissioner Ronald B. Peterson announced this week.

This was 105,000 above July 1966 and only 10,000 below the record level of June this year.

Nonagricultural employment in July reached a new peak for the month—6,912,000. Commissioner Peterson noted that this was 149,000 higher than in July 1966 but was slightly lower than the all-time high reached in June, because of seasonal cutbacks in manufacturing and retail trade.

This decline in nonagricultural employment was the smallest June-to-July dip since 1958, because of a greater-than seasonal increase in employment in the service industries and a less-than-normal contraction in government jobs, Commissioner Peterson said.

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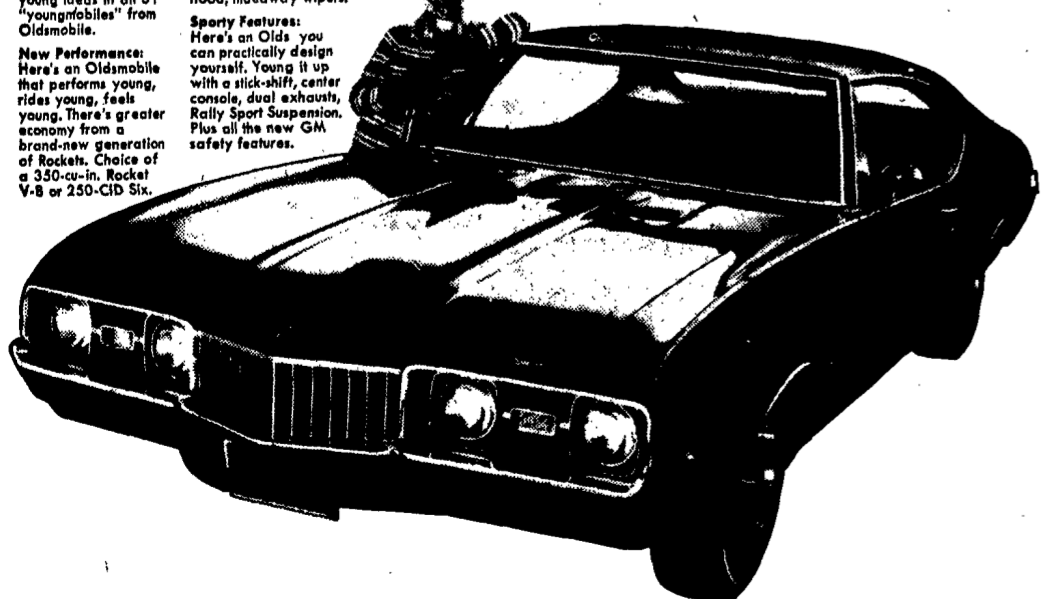
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
