We are sure that within a few weeks, depending on the speed or slowness of the U.S. sea mail, 350 Vietnamese children at the Tu Duc Orphanage Nationale will get an object lesson in American kindness, generosity and love for children.

The 135 pounds of color books, crayons and toys, gifts of people in this area from St. Regis Falls to Utica, Troy, and Massena, and other places were mailed last week to be used by Pfc. Chester Pierce and four other servicemen, members of Friendship Team which works with the children one day each week. Several weeks ago the servicemen's mother mailed two boxes of pads, pencils, pens and popcorn which were the gift of a Massena family.

I expect anyone will have a hard time convincing the children that Americans are "dirty capitalists."

Here's hoping that some of the many adults who bemoan that the Norwood children "have nothing to do" will jump on the bandwagon and help get the Cub Scout movement off the ground (and keep it off) and help the swamped adult leaders of both the Boy and Girl Scout Troops. pay \$175 to have a duct turned part way around?

Ans: Our error of omissions amounts to about \$600 but we have negotiated credits for you amounting to more than \$700.

Question: We thought that much more grading would be done outside to the drains.

Ans: An interceptor drain was installed so water does not run down the walk and there will be a rebate for any work bid but not done. Despite a lengthy discussion relative to water running from the school building or from the highway to the parking lot area, apparently the drainage plans will remain the same and the trees will not be a casualty of the construction.

Question: Why was the north wall of the garage removed to supposedly give a substantial increase in storage space, but we find that a row of posts does not give much extra space?
