

Contests for Nov. 7 Election Revealed for Area Voters

Canton—A check with the St. Lawrence County Board of Elections this week revealed that, in addition to voting on more than 100 candidates seeking offices in local townships, area voters will vote in four county contests and four state judgeship races.

In county contests, incumbent County Judge Edmund Shea of Ogdensburg is unopposed for his seat; incumbent District Attorney William H. Power Jr., (R) of Massena will oppose Lawrence X. Dalton (D); David E. Donaldson (R) and Henry J. Dobies (D) both of Massena will seek one of two corner seats, while incumbent Alexander E. Dodds (R) of Edwards and William J. Griffin (D) of Oswegatchie will oppose each other for the second.

In statewide races, Supreme

Court Judge Paul Graves of Gouverneur is endorsed by all four parties to remain in his seat, while Supreme Court Judge Norman Harvey of Plattsburgh (R), who has the endorsement of the Conservative party, faces William Quinn of Schenectady (D), who is endorsed by the Liberal party.

Also, Court of Appeals Judge Charles Breitel (R) of New York City will be opposed by Kenneth Mullane (C). Breitel is endorsed by the Democratic and Liberal parties. The other Court of Appeals Judge, Matthew Jason (R) of Lakeview is endorsed by all four parties.

TOWN OF BRASHER
In the Town of Brasher incumbent Ira Curtis (R) will

oppose M. James Dawson (D) for supervisor; Kathryn G. Kennedy (R) will oppose Patricia D. King (D) for town clerk; and incumbent Paul E. Dumas (R) will face Bernard Shorette (D) in the race for highway superintendent.

Also, incumbent Burton Meacham (R) will oppose Eugene LaShomb (D) for assessor for four years; William Grant (R) will oppose Patrick McGreevy (D) for assessor for two years; Frances La Garry (R) will oppose incumbent Frances White (D) for tax collector; Arthur Cassada (R) will oppose incumbent Gerald Burns (D) for justice of the peace, and William Quinnell (R) will face incumbent Norval Bennett in the race for the town councilman.

TOWN OF COLTON
In the Town of Colton, in-

Republican incumbents Clark Chittenden, supervisor; Phyllis Daby, town clerk; Sidney Conklin, highway superintendent; Vance Lucas, assessor; Clyde Hooper, assessor; Frank Baldwin, justice of the peace, and James Tharrett, councilman, are unopposed for the

offices they now hold.

TOWN OF LAWRENCE
In the Town of Lawrence, William G. Gale (R) will oppose James H. Donovan (D) for the seat vacated by former supervisor Neilson G. Skiff. Irene C. Rhodes (R) will face Irene Roach (D) for the vacant town clerk's office.

Also, incumbent Donald Ayers (R) will oppose Napoleon Bedard (D) for highway superintendent; incumbent Howard Frary (R) will face Victor Burnett in one assessor race while Lawrence Wagstaff (R) and Donald Francis (D) will seek the other post; incumbent Peter Otto (R) will oppose Matthew Gaffney (D) for justice of the peace; and incumbent councilman Robert Patten (R) will oppose Charles Hourihan.

TOWN OF MADRID
All candidates for office in the Town of Madrid are unopposed. Lloyd Finnegan (D), supervisor; Virginia Molnar, (D), town clerk; Charles Cryderman (R), highway superintendent; Stanley Aitchison (R), assessor; George Smith (R), assessor, and Councilman Gabriel Sullivan (D), are incumbents. Floyd Fisher (R) is guaranteed of the vacant justice of the peace seat.

TOWN OF NORFOLK
In the Town of Norfolk, Alford Smith (R) will oppose incumbent Howard Hall (D) for the town supervisor's seat. Incumbent town clerk Margaret Haggart and incumbent highway superintendent Leon Eurtio have been endorsed by both parties in the race for assessors. Republican incumbent Ivan McGlaughlin will be opposed by Harold Shantie (D) for one post, while Kenyon Jones (R) will oppose Dennis A. Raymo (D) for the other.

Also Joseph Hidy (R) will oppose James Sabad (D) for the vacant justice of the peace seat; incumbent library trustees Margaret J. Butler (R), Katherine Gang (R), and Bertrice Keyes (R) will face James Lewis (D), Marie Wagner (D) and Betty Medien (D), respectively.

TOWN OF PARISHVILLE
In the Town of Parishville, incumbent Floyd Fenner (R) will oppose Malcolm Wilcox (D) for the post of super-

visor. Also incumbent assessor Richard Bicknell (R) will face Albert Groebler (D); and Loren H. Barton (R) will face Lawrence Strader (D) for the assessor seat presently held by Clarence Crystal who was beaten in the primary by Barton. Incumbent councilman Walter Clark (R) will be opposed by Lloyd Foster (D).

Other Republican incumbents, Velma Hoyt, town clerk; Floyd Remington, highway superintendent; and Merle Wickwire, justice of the peace, are unopposed.

TOWN OF PIERREPONT
In the Town of Pierrepont, all Republican incumbents are unopposed. They include supervisor Glenn Thomas, Town Clerk Erva McIntosh, Highway Superintendent Lawrence Tupper, Assessors Roy Thomas and Alton Rood, tax collector Geraldine Ostrander and Councilmen Rex Brown and Charles McEwen.

TOWN OF POTSDAM
In the Town of Potsdam, Richard Murphy (R) will oppose incumbent supervisor Frances Healey (D); and Walter Cameron (R) will oppose incumbent Donald Jones (D) for highway superintendent. Incumbent assessors W. Nye Smith (R) and Floyd Collins (R) will oppose John Hourihan (D) and John Maroney (D), respectively. Also, incumbent Councilmen Joel Merriman (R) and Paul Evans (R) will oppose Dorothy Forbush (D) and Theodore White (D), respectively.

Town clerk Miriam Anderson (R) has been endorsed by both parties while justice of the peace Robert Halliday (R) is unopposed.

TOWN OF STOCKHOLM
In the Town of Stockholm, incumbent supervisor Clyde Flint (R) will oppose Maurice Mahoney (D). Incumbent Town Clerk Duana Carey and incumbent Highway Superintendent Silas Hunter have been endorsed by both parties.

Incumbent assessor Augustus Marscher (R) will oppose Floyd Barton (D) for one post, while William Hansdell

(R) opposes Clarence Richards (D) for the other. In the race for the two seats in the town board, incumbent Harold Phippen (R) and Edward Tanner (R) face Edgar Kelly (D) and Raymond Munson (D).

UF Drive Receives 'Big Boost'

The Potsdam Area U.F. Campaign received a "big boost" at the official kick off held last Sunday evening with an initial report of more than \$7,900 collected for 19 percent of the \$41,050 area goal.


The annual Dutch treat affair, held at the Treadway Inn and attended by over 200 persons from all sections of the county, marked the beginning of a concerted effort to raise \$275,000 for 30 separate youth and community health services. Otis M. Smith, deputy general consul for General Motors Corp. in Detroit, spoke.

According to Ernest M. Moore this is the largest figure ever reported at the beginning of the local drive. Moore emphasized that the campaign will not be extended beyond the Oct. 29 deadline. "The initial reports prove that we can get the job done with 100 percent results," stated the chairman.

The main theme of the whole drive is to "give where you work." The Residential and Rural division will contact only persons who are retired or work out of their homes. Moore expressed the hope that every employer no matter how large or small will "get behind the effort" to ask and encourage their employees to get at work. "If this is done we will be certain of success," stated Moore.
