Theatre Group Goes Into High Gear

Theatre Group - Patron Drive
The Potsdam Community Theatre's 1967 - 68 season moves into high gear this week as rehearsals begin for the musical "Fantasticks" and the annual patron drive is opened in the area.

Each patron will receive two tickets to each Community Theatre production for the total cost of \$10. for the season. One season ticket will cost \$5. The organization plans a minimum of three plays during the year with the first, "Fantasticks" to be performed in the Civic Center Theatre Friday and Saturday, Nov. 3 and 4.

"The Fantasticks" has set the record for an off-Broadway musical. It opened in New York City in 1960 and is still playing to capacity crowds. A fantasy, it is based on a farce by Edmund Ross and music by Harvey Schmidt. Many of the tunes from the musical have be-

come single hits. The Community Theatre has presented a number of musicals during the past few years, in addition to serious fare. The Gilbert and Sullivan farces "Pinafore," presented last March, and "The Mikado," staged in March, 1965, proved big successes.

Previously the group presented Ed Sheridan's "The Rivals." The comedy "Time of The Cuckoo" was the organization's most recent production, given in Potsdam last Spring.

'Mock Bach' Music Satire First in Series of Concerts

"An Evening with P.D.Q. Bach," one of the most successful musical satire programs of recent years, will open the 1967-68 Artist Series at the State University College at Potsdam. The Bach program will be presented starting at 8:30 p.m. Oct. 9, in the College Theater.

Four programs have been scheduled in the current series, which is sponsored by the Student Government Association at the college. A fifth attraction is expected to be added to the series, for a date next spring to be determined.

"P.D.Q. Bach" will be followed by a Nov. 20 concert by baritone William Warfield; a Feb. 1 program by French pantomimist Marcel Marceau; and a Feb. 26 jazz concert by the Don Shirley Trio.

Under the management of S. Hurok and the direction of Peter Schickele, an evening with P.D.Q. Bach features a full complement of musicians, in a parody of classical music styles and conventions.

Critics have praised it for its scholarly authoritativeness at the same time they have chuckled at its musical antics. Presentations in New York City at Town Hall and Philharmonic Hall brought forth articles in several national publications, leading to the current national tour.

P.D.Q. Bach is the name of a dubious son of the late Johann Sebastian Bach. Many people suspect he is the in-

vention of Schickele and most of the music on the program is ascribed to his authorship. The music is performed by an ensemble called the Royal P.D.Q. Bach Festival Orchestra, one of whose many bizarre instruments is a "left-handed sewer flute," described by a national magazine as "a masterpiece of intricate plumbing."

Schickele himself is a former instructor at the Juilliard School of Music. He introduces each work on the program with an incoherent lecture about its history and significance.

Tickets for admission to events in the series may be obtained at the door the night of each performance on a first-come-first-serve basis. Public sale may be limited, depending on advance student and faculty subscription.

Punt, Pass, Kick Pigskin Program Set by Jaycees

"Punt, Pass and Kick," a program of non-contact football competition for boys age 8 through 13, will be held in Potsdam Saturday morning, Oct. 14, under the sponsorship of the Potsdam Jaycees and Scott Ford.

Competition will begin at 9 on the Potsdam Central School football practice field. Last year, 103 boys punted, passed and kicked the "pigskin" during the annual contest. Winners were, age 8: Brian Kirkley, Bill Lahey, and Tom Sawyer; age 9: Joey Charlebois, David Dunn, and Tommy Taylor, and age 10: Pat Bristol, Brian Manley, and John Fonda.

Also, age 11: Dick Serabian, Paul Ceglarski, and Peter Clark; age 12: Len Ceglarski, Mike Whalen, and Gary Elliott; and age 13: Mark Snyder, Charles Bullard, and David Nicola.

A national program originating some years ago by Ford Motor Company with the United States Jaycees, Punt, Pass and Kick gives boys a chance to compete with other boys of the same age in three basic football skills - punting, passing and kicking from a kicking tee.

To enter, a boy must register with one of his parents at Scott Ford, Market St., Potsdam, before Oct. 6. There is no cost for registration.

John E. Dennett, Potsdam Jaycees project chairman, stresses that there is no body contact, no special equipment needed, and participation does not impair a boy's amateur standing.

Each participant receives on registering a booklet containing football tips by National Football League personnel, and a pin designating the wearer as a participant.

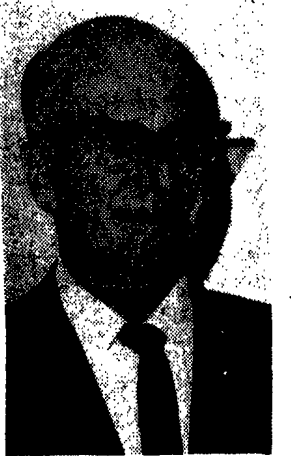
He taught school for one term and then entered the University of Michigan Dental School. Upon graduation in 1896, he began his interrupted practice in Potsdam.
