Through the year these officers are appointed to and serve on various committees that may run from negotiating for right-of-ways for desirable changes of road beds that will improve the flow of traffic. While most of St. Lawrence county's 32 townships will elect one councilman and one justice on Nov. 7, the Town of Stockholm is unique in that it will elect two councilmen. Some years ago legislation stripped the office of justice from two of the four who served in this dual role in all towns, creating two singular offices of councilman and retaining two dual offices of justice-councilman.

It appears that the two men chosen to retain the plural role were selected for geographical and therefore convenient reasons and it happened that their terms of office expired at the same time. If those who propose to eliminate local justices altogether are successful in their efforts, the local justices may soon vanish from the scene and with them, the local court system. Since the manner in which these officers execute their duties, especially the justices it is extremely important that all voters consider carefully the qualifications of candidates and recognize the impact upon the future structure of local government when casting their ballot.

Note: Legislation in recent years requires that a newly elected justice must attend a special justice school and satisfactorily complete the course before he is permitted to act in this capacity.

The reports include home addresses, test scores, anticipated college majors and career intentions of the commended students. 
