Medieval music at art center

The New World Consort, a young ensemble will present a production of Adam De LaHalle's thirteenth century musical the play of Robin and Marion at the Adirondack Lakes Center for the Arts in Blue Mountain Lake on Thursday, August 19, at 8:30 p.m.

The New World Consort is a group of young musicians with the strong conviction that early music was never meant to be treated as a museum piece; that indeed as much as later music it is a strong expression of the human condition whose spontaneity must not be sacrificed.

Since its conception in 1971, the New World Consort has established itself as one of the most highly respected early music groups on the East Coast. In addition to performing the standard medieval and Renaissance repertoire, the Consort has always attempted to think innovatively in terms of presentations, program expansion, and the use of allied arts.

Since their very first public appearance they have performed in costume (thus becoming the trend-setters for the current practice in early music concerts); in 1973 they added to their repertoire a carefully coordinated multimedia program, utilizing slides of medieval art in conjunction with the music; and in 1974 they took the New York early music scene by storm with their highly-acclaimed staged production of the thirteenth century "Play of Robin and Marion", with which they have been touring nationally ever since.
