

Conference to focus on U.S. Latin American neighbors

When we of the United States think of the nations of Latin America, we may too often think only of the problems associated with them and too seldom of their importance as neighbors in our hemisphere.

annual Social Studies Conference--scheduled for August 15 through 20--will concentrate on deepening participants' understanding of our southern neighbors and their relationships with our country by dealing with "Latin America: Problems and Perspectives."

Certainly, Latin America has had its share of problems, stemming largely from years of subjection under European imperialism during which they were exploited but little developed, but as for potential, in terms of human and natural resources, the area is

basically "untapped." During the Potsdam conference experts will be discussing Latin American politics, economics, human rights, religion, international relations and numerous other topics essential to a realistic appreciation of Latin America's place in the world.

Of particular significance from the United States' perspective will be discussions of the future role of this country in the Panama Canal Zone, and the future of U.S.-Cuban relations, plus Soviet interest and influence in South America and the inroads made by Marxist-Leninist doctrines.

Several local authorities will be presenting lectures during the five-day conference along with experts from the U.S. Department of State, the Canadian Department of External Affairs, the Russian Embassy in Ottawa, the State Education Department and various colleges and universities in the eastern

United States. Victor Minotti, Potsdam geographer and conference director, said that he expects more than 200 persons to attend the conference, including many social studies teachers from throughout New York State and others interested in the conference theme. Most will be participating for college credit.

State University College at Potsdam President Thomas M. Barrington will welcome participants at the opening dinner Sunday evening, August 15, and the conference will close with a panel discussion on Friday morning, August 20.

Local people making presentations during the conference will be Luther H. Gulick, chairman of the Potsdam College's geography department; Miles Wolpin of the college's political science faculty; Stephen Sumner of the art faculty and Betty Sumner a doctoral candidate in Latin American Studies at

Syracuse University. Richard Moore's, geography; William B. Garcia, foreign languages; James Wightman, economics; Poeliu Dai, political science; Edward Magdol, history; Minotti; Joseph D. Yenerall, sociology; and the Rev. Bernard F. Kellogg, Pastor, St. Francis of Assisi Newman Center, will be among those serving as chairmen of various sessions.

Among the highlights for participants will be a day in Montreal on Wednesday, August 18, during which conferees will visit the Olympic Stadium, and be addressed by Derek Frazer, deputy director, Latin American Division, Department of External Affairs (Canadian); and Anatoly I. Zoubekhin, first secretary and cultural attache, Embassy of the U.S.S.R., Ottawa.

Buckley blasts Senate decision

Senator James L. Buckley (C-R,N.Y.) today said the decision by the Senate to exclude elementary and secondary school pupils from receiving tax deductions for tuition represents a "continuing discrimination against those millions of our countrymen who are struggling to support alternatives to

the public education monopoly." Senator Buckley, sponsor of the amendment to the tax bill which would have given tax deductions for all students in public, private and parochial schools, warned his fellow Senators that "they will again be hearing from those Americans who

today have received from the Congress the back of its hand." He said that the "clear message of the Roth Amendment," which limits deductions to college students, is that "millions of our countrymen" have "waited in vain" to be given a fair break.

Carey appoints Bartle

Governor Hugh L. Carey has announced that he had appointed Oswego County Legislator and thirtieth District Congressional candidate Noram A. Bartle to the St. Lawrence-Eastern Ontario Commission.

Bartle's name will be submitted by the Governor to the New York State Senate for confirmation when the legislature convenes again in January of next year.

In a letter to Bartle, Carey said "I am pleased you have accepted this recess appointment and thank you for your willingness to serve the people of our state."

The Commission was created by the state government in 1968 "to encourage the preservation, enhancement, and development of the scenic, historic, recreational, and natural resources of the St. Lawrence and Eastern Lake Ontario area, and to encourage the full development of the commercial, industrial, agricultural, residential, and other resources which are vital to the continued progress of the area," according to an official description of its purpose.

The Commission's jurisdiction encompasses nine towns in Jefferson County and seven (plus the city of Ogdensburg) in the County of St. Lawrence which border on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River.

In addition, six towns and the City of Oswego in Oswego County and the Town of Sterling in Cayuga County were added to the Commission's jurisdiction in 1973 in order to facilitate a comprehensive development planning for the region.

The Commission's members are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate. Include four Jefferson County residents, four St. Lawrence residents, two residents of Oswego County, one of Cayuga County,

and two without respect to residence. In commenting on her appointment to the regional planning body, Bartle said, "I'm very glad to have this chance to participate in the future development of the St. Lawrence-Eastern Ontario region through this appointment. I'm particularly anxious to get to work on the region's economic problems, and I feel that the commission's perspectives in this area will be very valuable in deciding on a course of action to help get the economy of this part of the North Country on its feet."
