

Stockholm Board discusses Cable TV, other topics

A new Home Box Deal for Cable T.V. viewers was among the topics discussed at the August 10 meeting of the Stockholm Town Board in Windrop.

A letter received from Paul Blanchard read that the Box would enable viewers to watch movies for three or more hours with no interruptions. It would cost \$12 to \$14 more a month than is now being paid.

A public hearing will be held, but subscribers will not be obligated to have the box installed.

A number of issues were discussed which need to be further investigated before any actions are taken. One of these was the need to adopt some sort of legislation concerning wetlands before September 1. The board will talk to Richard Grover about it.

The Recreation contract is still at an impasse.

The post of Deputy Engineer in the Highway Department will be abolished,

but the post can be recreated later on if there is a need for it.

A controversy continues on the paying of sewer rents if it is not being used. Old contracts are being studied.

The designated polling places will be the same as last year.

Barbara Murray was named to the Board of Appeals.

Note was made of the Annual Parishville Historical Day August 21, and the board expressed a wish that everyone attend the dinner, bus tours and craft displays.

County Legislator Carl LaSalle spoke on the state's taking over the Court System, which he said was a certainty, with a 25 percent takeover each year for four years.

He said of Rural Transportation that there would be a public hearing October 18 at 7 p.m. in the Board Room in Canton.

Justices of the Peace, it was reported, will no longer be permitted to sit on the town boards, although they may attend

meetings. Information on details was not immediately available.

A Whalen estimate on the price for paving the driveway at the Municipal building was \$3,045. The board voted to buy a new 12 to 15 cubic foot refrigerator for the Municipal building at a cost not to exceed \$400. A new copy machine will be tried out, and, if satisfactory, may be purchased next month.

In attempting to declare a little-used road as an abandoned one, the board lacked some information and details, and will check with John Cook.

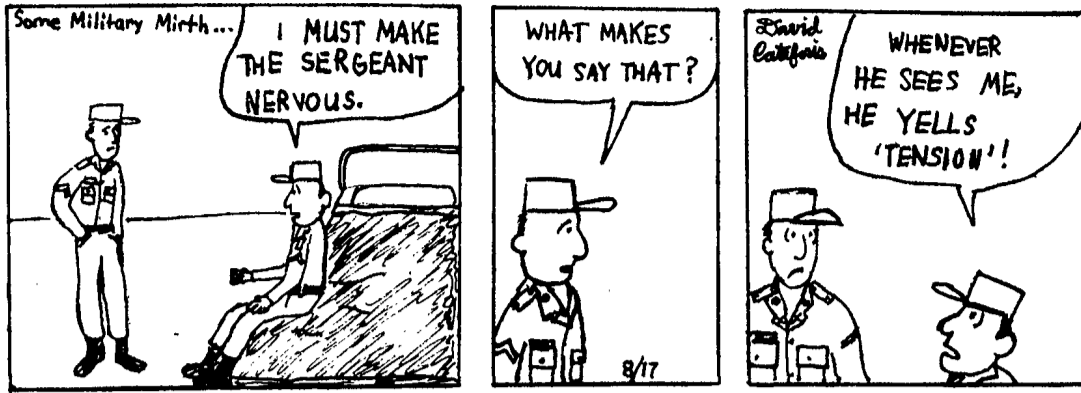
Superintendent of Highways, Eldin Jones, will hire an extra man for work for several weeks.

County receives safety monies

Approval of a \$2286 federal grant for a public safety education program in St. Lawrence County schools was announced today by Governor Hugh L. Carey's Traffic Safety Committee.

The committee chairman, Motor Vehicle Commissioner James P. Melton, said these funds would help county officials to prevent traffic accidents by conducting a safety education course for pre-literate school children. This course will feature the cartoon filmstrip Traffic and Pedestrian Education Systems (TAPES) program developed by the Department of Motor Vehicles in cooperation with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The application by James Griffith, Chairman, of the St. Lawrence County Traffic Safety Board, noted that the county has 19 public school districts, and a parochial school system with a

combined enrollment of 28,000 students. He said the introduction of the TAPES program in these school districts this September would provide a valuable foundation for current instruction in pedestrian safety, bicycle safety and school bus safety.

Griffith will serve as general supervisor of the project, which will be conducted through September 30, 1977, in cooperation with the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Department. Total cost of the project is \$5,049 with the county providing \$2,754 for personal services.

The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee is comprised of officials from nine state agencies who administer federal funds allocated under the Highway Safety Act. Since 1967, this committee has disbursed more than \$49 million for 871 local and statewide safety projects.

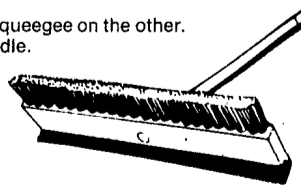
