Sue's Zucchini

Zucchini Bread

3 eggs, 2 1/2 cups sugar, 1 cup oil (or use melted lard), 2 cups grated zucchini, 3 cups of flour, 1 teas. salt, 1 teas. baking soda, 2 teas. cinnamon, 2 teas. vanilla. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes, P.S. If you grate zucchini in blender, then add 3 1/2 cups flour. Add chopped nuts if desired.
