Sierra Club attacks PSC

The Sierra Club's local group has strongly criticized recent actions of the Public Service Commission in deciding important health and safety issues on the proposed 765 kV line when it knew all the testimony on the issues had not been completed.

In a letter to Chairman Kahn of the PSC, the group charged that "By rushing to judgment on an admittedly incomplete record, apparently under pressure from PANSY, the PSC not only violated the letter of article VII which requires and only permits a decision on a complete record, but violated its spirit by failing to adequately consider many environmental and health and safety factors raised by the Department of Environmental Conservation and others."

The group also criticized the lack of an opportunity for members of the public to participate in the health and safety hearings to make their views known to the PSC.
