

Carey honored with Lectureship

Dr. Glenn O. Carey, Professor of English and Associate Dean, College of Arts and Sciences, Eastern Kentucky University, has been informed by the Council for International Exchange of Scholars in Washington that he has been honored with a senior Fulbright Lectureship for Tehran University, Tehran, Iran, where he will teach American literature and American studies.

Dr. and Mrs. Carey lived at 15 Leroy Street, Potsdam from 1962-1967, when he was a professor of English at Potsdam State College. Both Dr. and Mrs. Carey were active in community affairs during these years.

Applications for these prestigious lectureships total in the thousands annually with only several hundred being chosen. Candidates for the 1976-77 awards applied by July 1, 1975, and after stringent reviews by numerous committees, both here and abroad, the successful candidates are announced. Dr. Carey also was awarded a Senior Fulbright Lectureship in 1965-66, before coming to Eastern, when he was with the State University of New York. His first Fulbright professorship was to the University of Jordan, Amman, Jordan, where, besides teaching American literature-studies, he was a member of the university's Executive and Academic Affairs Councils.

Besides being granted two Senior Fulbright Lectureships, an unusually high distinction, Dr. Carey was honored in 1974-1975 when he was elected national president of the College English Association (CEA), the national English organization that lists among its past presidents Mark Van Doren, Henry Seidel Canby, Norman Foerster and John Ciardi. Dr. Carey has been a CEA national director and first and second vice-presidents as well as speaking and chairing sessions at the national conferences.

Dr. Carey was a visiting Fulbright Lecturer to Nicosia, Cyprus, in December, 1965, where he presented a series of talks on American literature at Greek and Turkish colleges. In 1965 and 1967, Dr. Carey received two grants

from the State University of New York Research Foundation for research on the writings of William Faulkner.

He is also a member, by invitation, of the National American Studies Faculty, a selected group of American Studies professors who are available for campus visits and consultations. In 1975, his textbook, "Quest for Meaning: Modern Short Stories," was published by the David McKay Company, "in response," as the introduction reads, "to teachers' requests for a short-story textbook with editorial intrusions." He also has been elected to the membership of the National Book Critics Circle, a group primarily made up of professional, full-time book critics.

Dr. Carey has published widely in various literary journals, with a general total of 30 articles, (many of them on William Faulkner) and over 180 book reviews in various subject areas). His reviews and articles have been published in The Saturday Review, American Quarterly, Library Journal, Choice, CEA Critic, Research Studies, Arizona Quarterly, Studies in the Twentieth Century, Military Review, South Atlantic Bulletin, and Journal of English and Germanic Philology, among others. He is a regular book reviewer for the Lexington Herald-Leader and the Louisville Courier-Journal and Times.

Dr. Carey has a B.A. and M.A. from Pennsylvania State University, and his

Ph.D. from the University of Illinois. His vita is included in the Directory of American Scholars, Dictionary of International Biography, International Scholars Directory, Who's Who in American College and University Education, Biographical Directory of American Educators, Who's Who Among Authors and Journalists, among others. He is a lieutenant colonel, field artillery, army reserves, having served in World War II and the Korean War.

Dr. and Mrs. Carey and their family live in Richmond, where Mrs. Carey is the immediate past president (two-year term) of the Richmond League of Women Voters. They have three children: Gretchen, a graduate with a B.A. in philosophy from the State University of New York (at Stony Brook), who is married to Dr. Ranjan Roy, who has been recently selected to be a member of the Indian Institute of Advanced Studies at Simla, India; Christopher, a graduate in 1976 from Kenyon College with a B.A. in English, now living at home in Richmond; and John, a sophomore at New York University, enrolled in the School of Arts with majors in art and drama. All three of the Carey children are graduates of Model Laboratory School on the Eastern campus.

Dr. and Mrs. Carey will depart from Iran in early September where he will begin his Fulbright Lectureship responsibilities at Tehran University on Sept. 15.
