IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

The Public Health will sponsor an immunization clinic to be held at the Norfolk-Hepburn Library on September 8 from 2-3 in the afternoon. At this clinic, children may receive triple vaccine for protection against tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough, small-pox vaccinations, oral polio vaccine, measles vaccine against both the red and German measles and Mumps Vaccine. Rubella (German measles vaccine can be given to children up to 10 years of age.

The clinic will be under the supervision of a Health Officer, and will be conducted by the Public Health Nurse.
