Brodsky re-appointed

Russian-born art historian Vladimir Brodsky, Ph.D., has been re-appointed to the position of visiting professor in the department of fine arts at State University College at Potsdam and will be teaching a course in the art and architecture of Byzantium, it has been announced by William T. Gambling, acting chairman of the department.

Brodsky's course will be offered each Tuesday and Thursday from 7 to 8:15 p.m. in Brainerd Hall room 215. Participants in the course will study the history of art and architecture of Byzantium, including Hellenistic, early Christian and Oriental sources of Byzantine art, with particular attention given to the problem of the formation and evolution of canonic forms of Byzantine art.

Brodsky's position at Potsdam is funded by grants from the Program for Soviet Emigre Professionals and the New York Association for New Americans, Gambling noted.

Educated at Moscow University, from which he received his doctorate, in 1967, Brodsky also did graduate work at the USSR Academy of Art, Institute of the History and Theory of Fine Art.

Brodsky's primary emphasis has been on a comparative study of Oriental and Western art and he has published extensively within the Soviet Union on topics related to this study.

Barrington addresses faculty, notes changes

In contrast with the somewhat gloomy outlook of a little less than a year ago, when it seemed its budget might be irreparably diminished, State University College at Potsdam launched its 1976-77 academic year on a note of optimism with an address filled with encouragement, by President Thomas M. Barrington.

Barrington, in his first presentation to the faculty and staff since he returned from a six-month study leave in Europe, noted that his leave had provided an opportunity for gaining a broader perspective of the college which has been his "professional home for the past 30 years."

After tracing the college's development from "a Normal School to a Teachers College to a well-developed and well-respected liberal arts college, Barrington sketched a plan for further increasing the effectiveness of the college in the future.

"We need to continue our individual efforts in terms of scholarly and

creative activity and thus set an example for all of our students. We need to emphasize and re-emphasize the importance of effective teaching—in the classroom and outside the classroom.

We need to increase our interdisciplinary offerings, re-examine our programs for the older student and re-study the organizational model with respect to departmental structures.

We need to raise our academic standards, both for admission and retention.

Noting that a lowering of academic standards has a short-term appeal because it helps a college meet enrollment quotas from a shrinking college-age population, Barrington asserted that "quality tends to search out quality and it is imperative, in my judgment, that we develop at Potsdam State a reputation which puts us above most of the other colleges to which students might apply in New York State.

The message must permeate our public school system that Potsdam is

just as fine an academic institution for bright students as any of the University Centers and that, in addition, we have many other advantages in relationship to the total environment for living and learning."

While challenging the faculty to stress academic excellence, he charged them with the responsibility to be concerned about the exposure of students to "the full meaning of maturity, to the full meaning of personal freedom."

Barrington told the faculty to encourage and inspire their students "to reach for their own individual stars in order to understand the full implications of leading a meaningful and a

At the beginning of his address, Barrington expressed his gratitude to Kenneth Gant "for his willingness to serve both as acting vice president in academic affairs for 1975-76 and as acting president during the period February 15 to June 15 when I was in Europe."

Barrington also reported several new appointments for this academic year as follows: Robert Thayer, acting dean, Crane School of Music; William Crowder, acting associate dean, Crane School of Music; Joseph Morrison, acting associate dean, School of Liberal Studies; Dr. Roger Spugnardi, director, Research and Demonstration Center; Alex Wachler, chairman, department of foreign languages; William Thompson, chairman, department of philosophy; Kenneth Thygesen, chairman, department of physics; and Richard Del Giudice, acting chairman, department of political science.

He also made reference to the fact that the State Legislature had restored \$350,000 for the operation of the Research and Demonstration Center (Campus School) and appropriated an additional \$75,000 for the college library. The college's public relations department was also granted a full budget restoration by the Legislature.
